Books about various leaders or events of the Civil War head the group of new books going into circulation Saturday, Feb. 28, at the Malheur County Library.

Sherman—Soldier, Realist, American—by Basil H. Liddell Hart is a new edition of a classic biography which has long been out of print. The author regards Sherman as the dominant military genius of the Civil War.

Lee of Virginia—by Douglas Southall Freeman was found among Freeman's papers after his death. The author could scarcely neglect Lee the military genius, but it is Lee the man who comes to the fore—the Lee who was greatest in defeat.

Last Train From Atlanta—by A. A. Hoehling tells a heroic story of an American city under siege.

Mr. Lincoln's Navy—by Richard S. West presents the history of the Union Navy's vital role in the Civil War, tells of its blockade of the Confederacy, its breaking the Confederacy in half by taking control of the Mississippi River, and its protection of Yankee Commerce on the high seas.

Make Free—by William Breyfogle tells the story of the Underground Railroad.

Gentle Tamers—by Dee Brown tells about women in the Old West. All aspects of western feminine life, which includes a great deal about the Western male, are covered completely and authentically in this lively but factual account.

The Pig In The Barber Shop—by H. Allen Smith is a travel diary of the author's recent three month tour of Mexico in which his zany brand of humor is upmost.

But I Wouldn't Want To Live There—by Hester Jimenez relates the gay adventures of an American girl and her travels to Mexico and then Europe.

Rocketry And Space Exploration—by Andrew G. Haley gives the history of rocketry from its earliest beginnings to the eventful present. Famous men and milestones of rocketry, rocket production in the United States and abroad, and the future of rocketry and space exploration are also included.

My Ten Years As A Counter-spy—by Boris Morros describes the author's ten years as an agent for the Russians and the FBI, a dual role begun in 1947.

Crusades of Sunday Island—by Elsie K. Morton is a fictionalized account of a New Zealand family who went to an uninhabited desert island in the Pacific and led a real Swiss-Family-Robinson life.

Many Windows—by Faith Baldwin is an inspirational journey through the seasons, during which she shares her thoughts, hopes, joys, sorrows and her abiding faith in God.

Making The Most Of Your Estate—by Earl S. MacNeil through representative case studies gives specific suggestions as to how intelligent estate planning can best be done under present conditions.

Execution—by Colin McDougall tells of the story of the vain efforts of a group of soldiers to save one of their comrades, whose only crime is stupidity, from execution for murder.

Bright Road To Fear—by Richard M. Stern is a novel of suspense about two emperors of crime who were battling each other and Ricci who was caught between them.

Last Call For A Gunfighter—by Harry S. Drago tells a western story, moving, relentless, and hewing true to the bitter adage that if you live by the gun, you will die by the gun.

Theme For Ballet—by Vicki Baum explains that as 40-year-old Katja, prima ballerina of the Manhattan Ballet, is about to leave for a week end, she is suddenly called upon to replace an ill dancer.

As she prepares frantically we see her past life, her loves, her marriage (now collapsing), and always the world of the ballet.

With All The World Away—by Edwin Balymer is an absorbing novel about three young people, whose paths cross and whose lives become strangely intermingled, when each comes with high hopes to New York.
