Cow Hollow Homesteader Is Honored By Community on 90th Anniversary



Doc Raffington

"Doc" W. T. Raffington of Cow Hollow was honored guest Tuesday of last week when more than 100 friends gathered at the former Cow Hollow Grange hall to celebrate his 90th birthday.

Doc Raffington, a retired dentist, is a pioneer settler insofar as the Owyhee project is concerned. He settled in Cow Hollow in 1936 before Owyhee water came to the area which was all sagebrush, no roads, no water and "not a building in sight." He and Mrs. Raffington did most of their own work in clearing the land, building their home and farm buildings and preparing the land for cultivation.

At the present time, Doc Raffington supervises the operations of three places: his 120 acres at Cow Hollow, another farm in Sunset Valley and a third in Little Valley near Vale where he raises hogs.

Doc and Mrs. Raffington came here from Taloga, Okla., where he had practiced dentistry for several years—a total of 52 years in Oklahoma. He was graduated from the University of Missouri in 1904 and served as a dental circuit rider in Oklahoma territory where it took him 30 days to make the rounds with his dental chair, which he still has. "In between times" the pioneer dentist did some oil drilling and 50 years ago opened "Dixon No. 1" in Kansas.

The birthday party last week resulted from efforts of fellow-settlers in Cow Hollow, such as Clarence Niccum and several others, who reported that Doc Raffington was responsible for many of the improvements in the community and the inspiration of his leadership. Niccum recalled that it was Doc who spearheaded the drive for funds to build the Cow Hollow hall, traveling on foot all over the area to solicit funds, but setting a \$5 limit on contributions, then did a large part of the physical work in building it. "He spent about two weeks repairing the

hall and replacing broken windows just before his birthday, although he didn't know what the big gathering was for," Niccum commented.

Efforts were made to invite all the old settlers of Cow Hollow and adjoining communities and the response was terrific. Niccum said, "Everybody had a good time, including the 90-year-old honoree who sat out only one dance during the entire evening."
