NAZARENE Church News

Mrs. Wanda Knox, wife of the late pioneer Nazarene missionary Rev. Sidney Knox, will be speaking at the Church of the Nazarene Sunday.

Mrs. Knox will describe the opening of Nazarene work among the aboriginal people at Kudjip, in the highlands of New Guinea, which they started in October, 1955.

As part of their work Rev. and Mrs. Knox built a chapel where worship services and a day school were conducted. She was a teacher and nurse at the mission station.

To launch the work in New Guinea, Nazarenes gave a special free-will offering totaling \$102,000 on June 20, 1954. This was in commemoration of the fortieth anniversary of the Nazarene Foreign Missionary Society.

Annual Catholic Convo Scheduled Here April 29

The 18th annual conference of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine in the Diocese of Baker will be held in Nyssa Wednesday, April 29, at the Nyssa theatre. Several hundred delegates will be present for the conference, representing Ontario, Vale, Jordan Valley, Burns, and John Day.

Registration of delegates is slated to begin at 9 a.m. and general meeting at 10 a.m. The theme of the conference is "The Growth of the Church in Oregon." Morning session will be conducted by the adults. In the afternoon, the high school students will meet with the theme "Let us endeavor to equal and excel our past." Both meetings are open to the public.

Wilton Jackson will preside over the morning session and will introduce the speakers. Father Patrick Gaire of Heppner, a former Nyssa pastor, will give the keynote address: "The Catholic Church in Oregon." Other talks will be given by delegates from the neighboring cities: "Coming of the French Traders and First Priests to Oregon" by Michael A. Morgan of Burns; "Influence of Doctor John McLoughlin" by Mrs. Warren Hallum of John Day; "Creation of the Archdiocese of Oregon City in 1846" by Mrs. James Montgomery of Arook; "Work of the Early Bishops of Eastern Oregon" by John Dority of Nyssa; "Coming and Work of the Sisters in the Schools and Hospitals of Baker Diocese" by Richard Schevers of Ontario; "Oregon School Bill 1922" by Mrs. John C. Elfering of Vale; "The Whitman Massacre" by Raymond Tacke of Huntington.

Charles Lundy of Nyssa is chairman of the youth panel which will be directed by Father Fischer of Ontario and moderated by Father Sullivan of Jordan Valley. The panel participants who will give their local parish histories will be: Patricia Seaward, Burns; John Maple, John Day; Rosemary Jaca, Jordan Valley; Penny Lincoln, Nyssa; Saye Mendiguren, Ontario; William Elfering, Vale, and Joy Langley Huntington. The afternoon session featuring high school speakers is open to all and will begin at 1:30 p.m. at the Nyssa Theatre. The ladies of St. Bridget's Altar Society will serve dinners and luncheons to the visiting delegates in the Parish hall at noon.

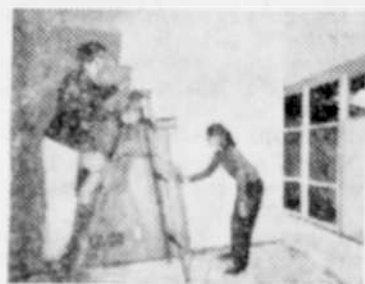
The topic of the pastor's message for the Sunday morning service, April 26, will be "Compromise to Satanic Inducements."
