Statewide Flowerland Contest Opens To Observe Centennial; Prizes Told

A "flowerland" contest sponsored by Oregon feed and seed dealers for the individual home-owner who wants to share in making the Centennial birthday a statewide success was announced this week.

The state will be divided into 17 districts with the home showing the best planting of annuals in each district receiving a \$10 award and second \$5. From these homes throughout the state, four grand prize winners will be selected, and awarded first prize \$100; second \$75; third \$50 and fourth \$25.

The following rules will govern the procedure: 1. Contest is open to all residents of the state of Oregon for 1959. 2. Plants must be annuals, that is from seed to seed in one year. 3. The planting must be visible from a public thoroughfare. 4. Plants may be from seed or purchased as started plants. 5. Entry blanks, filled out with details, must be returned to favorite garden supply store.

6. Entries must be in by July 10 with judging in August. 7. Owners of outstanding floral displays will be asked to submit in color a 35mm slide, with name and address printed on mounting. The Oregon federation of garden clubs and camera clubs of Oregon have offered their assistance and advice.

These slides will become, with the owner's permission, property of the sponsors, to be used as a traveling library of homes throughout the state.

8. Decision of the accredited judges will be final. 9. Members of the sponsoring groups and their families are not eligible to enter.

Little Pinky Roberts was so fond of her two baby rabbits Easy didn't have the heart to tell her they had run away.

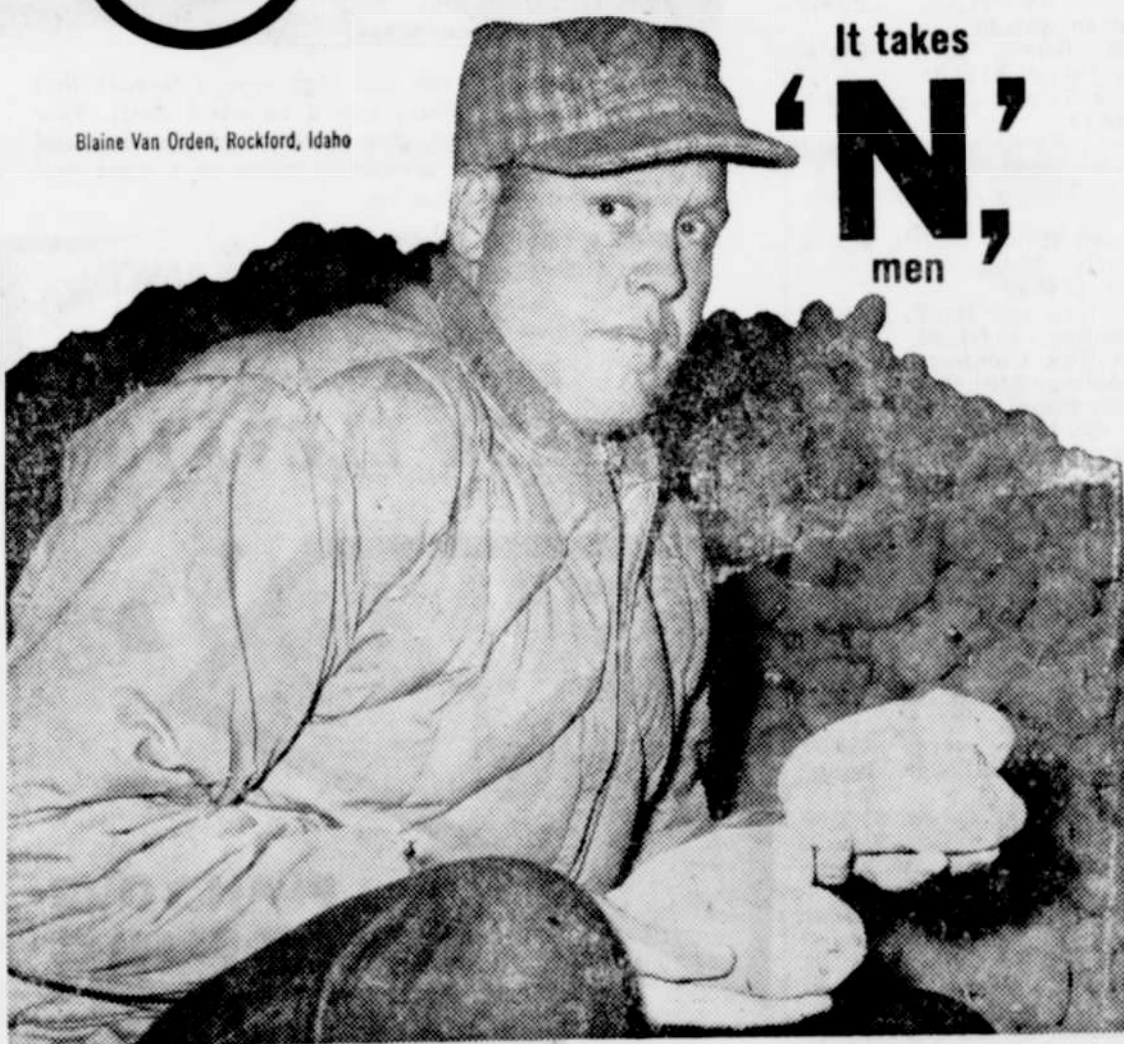
"Just had to replace those rabbits before Pinky came home from school," Easy said. "Trouble was the only two available were full grown."
