"Doctor Zhivago" Added to Shelves At Nyssa Library

A number of new books have recently been put into circulation at Nyssa city library, according to Mrs. Desmond Jones, librarian. They include:

ADULT FICTION

"Doctor Zhivago" by Boris Pasternak. The only truly great novel to come out of post-revolutionary Russia significantly appears first in translation without the approval of the Russian Communist party censorship. "Doctor Zhivago" is above all a stupendously rich and moving book. It evokes a historically crucial period in terms of a large variety of characters whose destinies are intertwined.

"Home from the Hill" by William Humphrey. Seldom have the sins of the father been visited on the first-born as wrenchingly as in this dark and beautiful first novel. This is a dramatic narrative about entirely believable people.

"The Stars Grow Pale" by Karl Bjarnhof. This is a moving story of a boy who is going blind. It tells of all that was typical about a boy growing up in a small Danish town at the beginning of the century and all that was special about the boy whose affliction placed him outside of the normal world.

"The Kean Land" by Jack Schaefer consists of the long title story and 10 short stories. All are concerned with some aspect of the West and within that framework there is great diversity of subject and of mood.

"If the Mirror Break" by Václav Rezac. Was it Vilem Haba or Jindrich Aust in the mirror? Was it Jindrich or Vilem who stood on the bridge in Prague? Was it the face of Eva Palas or Jarmila Sita for whom his haunted heart searched in the swirling waters? Where did he live, this lonely figure, on the boards of the National theater or in the Street of the Little Ditch in the ancient city of Prague?

"Dear and Glorious Physician" by Taylor Caldwell. Today St. Luke is known as the author of the third book of the New Testament, but two thousand years ago he was Lucanus, a Greek, a man who loved, knew the emptiness of bereavement and later traveled through the hills and wastes of Judea asking, "What manner of man was my Lord?" It is of this Lucanus that Taylor Caldwell writes.

"The Prospects Are Pleasing" by Honor Tracy. A fantastic plot is contrived by some Irish patriots to recover a Spanish painting from a London gallery, thus setting right "a grave injustice to Ireland."

"The Roots of Heaven" by Romain Gary. A novel of African adventure and intrigue has been awarded the coveted Prix Goncourt and has sold more than 300,000 copies in the original French edition.

Joab anticipated his cousin at every turn, often earning public reprimand in return; for David, Joab even sacrificed his beloved Reba and his own son. Why? Because David was the anointed of the Lord.

ADULT NON-FICTION

"The Look of Eagles" by John T. Godfrey portrays the life of the author. This story is heroic and human. The courage of his honesty makes this book, his final testament, as remarkable as his life.

HIGH SCHOOL FICTION

"South Town" by Lorenz Graham. Sixteen-year-old David Williams planned to go away to college and become a doctor. He wanted to help his people, be a spokesman for them and to make the white people understand them. David's parents were saving and planning for better opportunities for him and his sister. 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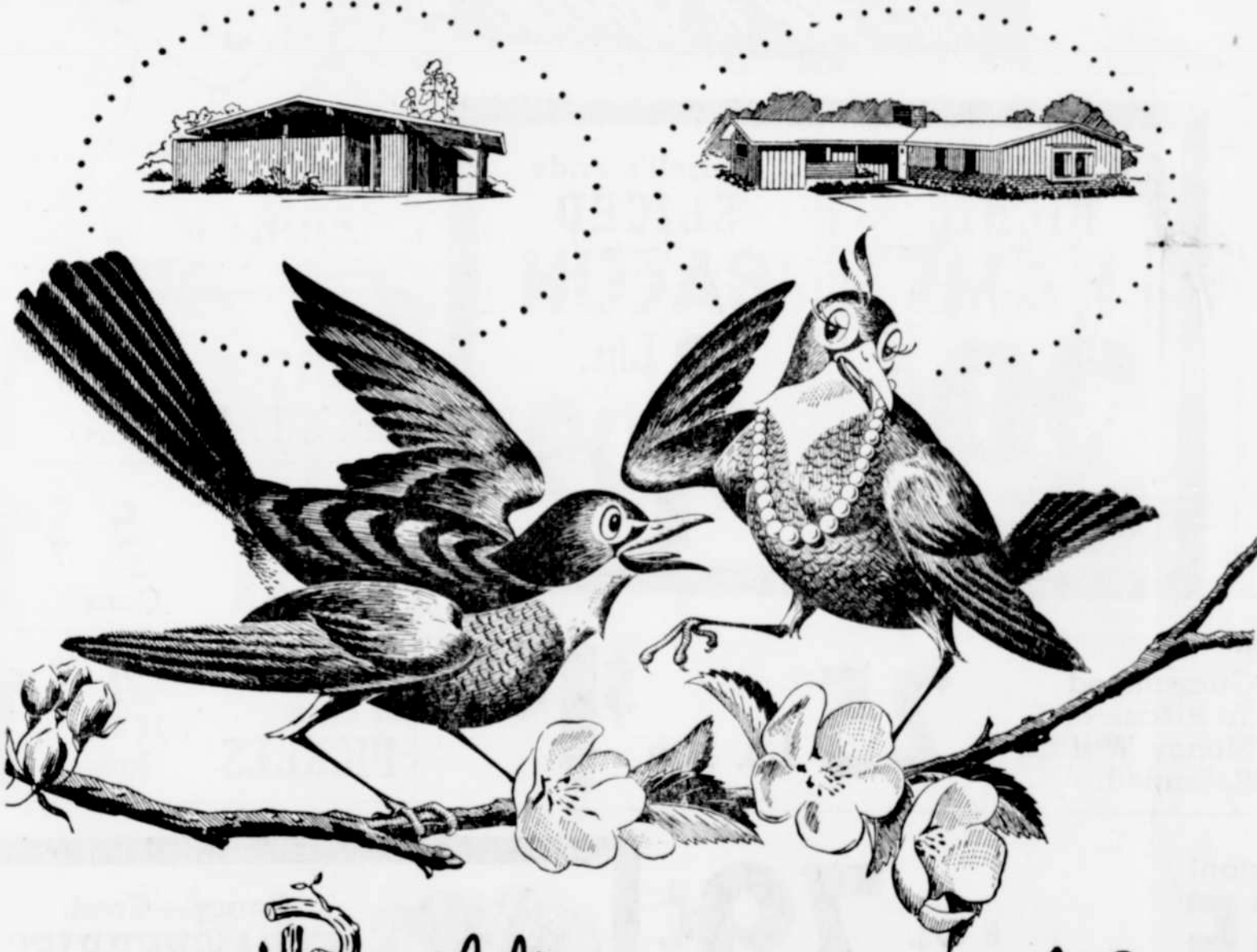
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
