Chest X-ray Unit To Visit in Nyssa Friday, Saturday

The mobile chest x-ray unit will be in Nyssa Friday and Saturday where it will be stationed in front of the Idaho Power company office from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. the first day and from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. Saturday, according to Mrs. David Sarazin, chairman for the survey in the Nyssa and Adrian area. The unit will return to the Nyssa labor camp May 26 for re-takes from 3 to 5 p.m. and 6 to 8 p.m. The services of the chest x-ray unit are available free of charge to all people from age 21 and over. All persons within this age range are urged to take advantage of the x-ray service which will take only a few minutes of their time, it was emphasized. The x-ray unit was stationed at the Adrian labor camp last Thursday. A number of Nyssa women have volunteered their services in assisting with the visitation of the units both here and at Adrian.
