## Buy Government Bonds?

Business and financial analyst Sylvia Porter writes:  
"Let's say that back in 1950 you received a cool \$10,000  
and had this lovely lump sum free to invest as you saw  
fit. If you had put the whole \$10,000 in a 'typical' one-  
family house, your investment now would be worth  
around \$15,000. If you had put it in the U. S. Treasury's  
2½ percent bonds due in 1967 (the marketable bonds  
sold by the government in the war loan drive of 1942)  
your \$10,000 now would be worth only around \$8,800.  
If you had put it in 'typical' farm land, your nestegg's  
value would have grown to \$16,139 by early this year.  
If you had put it in stocks—the across-the-board list of  
stocks in the Standard & Poor's stock average—your \$10-  
000 would be up to more than \$25,100 . . ."

## "How About You?"

The executive vice president of the Baton Rouge, La.,  
Chamber of Commerce, stated some plain facts about the  
fallacies and perils of federal aid to education when he  
said: "I predict that if the people . . . of the nation, ac-  
cept any more so-called federal aid for operation of our  
public school program we will regret it to our dying day."

"In the first place the federal government can't give  
us one thin dime that they didn't extract from us in the  
first place. So it certainly is no gift."

"Secondly, the federal government doesn't spend  
money, domestically anyway, that it doesn't control. For  
example, at present we receive federal aid in the field of  
vocational agriculture and home economics. And brother,  
the federal government calls the tune, whether it  
concerns the course of study demanded, the qualifications  
of teachers, the hours worked, the scope of teacher  
duties, or whatever . . ."

"Some of the proponents of federally-subsidized pub-  
lic education deny any intention of application of con-  
trols. How was it? Those gentlemen of the Supreme Court  
have already ruled that the federal government may con-  
trol that which it subsidizes."

"Some may want to submit to the socialization of  
America without a battle. Danged if I do — How about  
you?"

Frequently we hear the ex-  
pressions, "Our state government  
has forgotten Malheur county;
