Meat Carcasses For Food Require Producer's Tags

Oregon farmers are reminded that any meat food carcasses or parts of carcasses transported on the highways must be accompanied by a bona fide producer's tag. The state department of agriculture points out these tags are available from any of its livestock brand inspectors or officers throughout the state and also from county sheriffs.

State meat inspectors are running into untaxed carcasses at business places and at locker plants.

Deadline for Veterans Educational Aid Set

Oregon's World War II veterans must be enrolled in a course of training under the state veterans' educational benefits act by June 30 or lose their entitlement to the benefit forever.

Veterans enrolled on that date, or who have previously used the state benefit and plan to resume their present courses of study now or at a later date, may continue under the program until their entitlement runs out or they complete their educational objectives.

There is no deadline for Korean veterans to enter the program.

To qualify, the veteran must have been an Oregon resident for one year immediately prior to his World War II or Korean service, and he must be an Oregon resident when he applies for the benefit.

Benefits range from \$50 a month on down, depending on the type of schooling and the number of classroom hours of attendance.

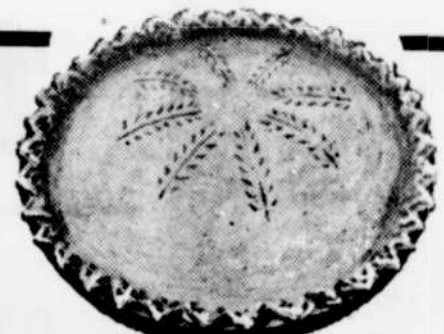
