Grain Warehouses
Required to Insure
Deposits on July 1

Effective July 1, all grain warehouses licensed by the state department of agriculture must fully insure the market value of grower grain deposits. The insurance must be against loss by fire, lightning, inherent explosion, cyclone, tornado or windstorm.

The only exception, and it applies to individual deposits, is grain for which the depositor waives the insurance requirement. Any person who does not wish his grain insured by the warehouse must notify the warehouse operator in writing to that effect.

This is a new provision in the 1959 amendments to the Oregon public grain warehouse act. Evidence of insurance coverage must be approved by and filed with the department at the time the annual license is renewed on July 1. The insurance requirement is in addition to bonding feature which has been in effect for some time.

If a warehouse license has expired or been revoked or if the full amount of bond has not been filed and approved and no insurance received, the 1959 act stipulates that the warehouse must post this sign: "This is not a licensed or bonded grain warehouse." The sign is to remain in place for at least a year.

Another change effective July 1 gives the department the right to inspect any unlicensed warehouse to determine if it should be licensed. A second 1959 act relating to grain modernized the Oregon law on storage of grain as a basis of farm credit.
