

Cuban Rebel Fidel Castro's Biography Heads List of New Books at Library

A biography of Fidel Castro, leader of the Cuban revolution, is the outstanding book among those which went into circulation June 13 at the Malheur county library.

"Fidel Castro: Rebel—Liberator or Dictator?" by Jules Dubois tells the inside of the Cuban revolution and presents a close-up picture of the bearded leader who dominated it.

"The Splendid Little War" by Frank Freidel presents the dramatic story of the almost forgotten Spanish-American war.

"The Helicopter" by Jacob Shapiro explains what the helicopter is and how it works within the general pattern of scientific ideas and mechanical experience understood by those innocent of engineering.

"Land in Search of God" by

Stanley Rowland is a penetrating, lively analysis of the current religious revival in the U.S. It explores this revival in its diverse aspects—from Billy Graham to Reinhold Niebuhr—and also digs into modern culture to expose its roots: the fragmentation of traditional values, our anxiety about ourselves and our world, and our search for a sense of identity and meaning.

"So You Want to Be Psychoanalyzed" by Judy Frieman explains what really happens to everybody during psychoanalysis.

"Hannibal" by Harold Lamb is a biographical narrative set in the ancient world of Rome and Carthage and centered on an incomparable military strategist most famous for his feat of leading an army with elephants over the Alps.

"The Fancher Train" by Amelia Bean is a novel about the massacre at Mountain Meadow during the Mormon rebellion.

Among other new books recently appearing on the shelves of the county library are the following:

"The White House and Its 32 Families" by Amy LaFollette Jensen tells the mansion's own story and the story of the families who have called it home.

"Arms Control and Inspection in American Law" by Louis Henkin points out the obstacles to arms control and inspection both in the U.S. and in other countries. He concludes that an arms control plan, if it could be made to operate effectively, could reduce world tensions and act as a strong deterrent to war.

"The Tales Christ Told" by April Oursler Armstrong contains the parables of Jesus retold to throw light on today's problems.

"Mostly Baseball" by Thomas Means is a 20-year collection of the best magazine articles of the nationally known sportswriter.

"Has Anybody Seen Me Lately?" by Corey Ford is a light-hearted collection of humorous pieces which expose the absurdities of beauty contests, office parties, reducing diets, TV, weekends and the do-it-yourself mania.

Other books added recently to the circulation list at the county library include the following:

"Animals in India" by Camilla Koffler contains a spectacular view of the fauna of India. The photographs are accompanied by captions which explain the animals and at the same time give an account of Indian life.

"Equipment in the Home" by Florence Ehrenkranz is a text-book for the homemaker on the operation, use and care of practically all types of gas, electric and mechanical appliances currently used in the home.

"A Simplified Guide to Collecting American Coins" by Hugh Knight contains basic information, profusely illustrated, designed to add interest and insight in coin collecting as a hobby.

"Handbook for Observing the Satellites" by Neale Howard presents a simple, clearly written description of the methods and equipment an amateur can use in setting up his own satellite observation program.

"A Philosophy of Administration" by Marshall Dimock brings into focus a variety of facets of the problem of administration. He centers his discussion on the need for the creative growth of all individuals in an organization as the criterion of good administration.

"A Century of Mountaineering" by Arnold Lunn was written to commemorate the centennial of the Alpine club. The author reviews important eras and exploits in the history of British and Continental mountaineering.

"The World Is Learning Compassion" by Frank C. Laubach shows how the compassion of Christ is reaching through and beyond the church to save the world. Examples cited are World Health organization, Red Cross, Care, World Neighbors and others.

"Buffalo Country" by Bob Duncan is a treasury of buffalo lore and legend—of the animal and of the men who hunted him.

"My Dog Rex" by Arthur Holman tells the story of Rex III, a black-and-tan Alsatian, who was the first dog to hunt criminals with the Flying Squad. The first trained to detect dope and the first police dog to be awarded medals for bravery by the PDCA and the Canine Defense league.

"Great Sea Rescues" by Edward R. Snow presents 19 accounts of the struggle of man to save lives, whether his own or those of fellow human beings, from the insatiable greed of death that prevails the deep.

"America's National Parks" by Nelson Keyes is a photographic encyclopedia of our magnificent natural wonderlands.

"Tenderloin" by Samuel Hopkins Adams is a romantic novel about sin and society in New York's Gay Nineties.

"Thousand Cranes" by Yasunari Kawabata has for its setting modern Japan and tells a simple story of ill-fated love.
