

Idaho-Oregon Onion Committee Is Named

Members and alternates who will serve for the next two years on the Idaho-Oregon Onion Committee which administers the Federal Marketing order regulating the handling of onions grown in the Idaho and Malheur county, Ore., production area, were announced recently by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Persons named will succeed those

whose terms expired May 31 and are as follows:

Producer Members, Alternates:

District 2—Harold Hart, member, and Tom Itami, alternate, both from Ontario.

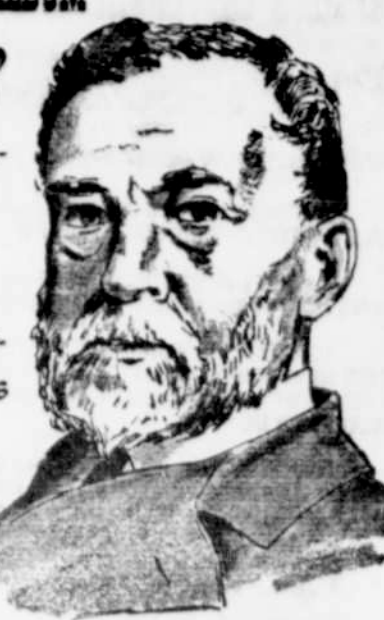

Traffic Safety Program Studied

Sixteen of Oregon's larger cities are in the process of learning how their traffic safety efforts compare with other cities throughout the nation and what national officials recommend for future efforts to combat accidents.

The evaluation program, which consists of presentation of analyses based on the 1943 annual inventory of traffic safety activities, involved state officials when the state-wide inventory analysis was presented on July 27, 28 and 29 in Salem.

A district director for the National Safety Council, the agency which administers the inventory program, presented the state evaluation and previously presented the report for Portland. Other city analyses were presented by traffic safety division representatives of the Department of Motor Vehicles as a staff service of the Oregon Traffic Safety commission.

State officials who presented the city inventories said they all have several things in common: they get scored down in enforcement because of the state's chemical test law and the statute requiring an officer to personally witness a misdemeanor before he can arrest.

The state and cities also suffer from lack of a requirement for drivers to immediately notify police in event of an injury accident and because police are not required to submit copies of their investigation reports to the state.

Lack of an active citizens committee to work with officials in developing sound programs for traffic management and accident prevention was apparent in several cities.

The need for supporting official law enforcement agencies and in getting more public cooperation is apparent in the increasing number of deaths and accidents. There were 235 traffic deaths for the year up to July 23, 1959, compared with 213 in the same period last year. Traffic deaths for July last year totaled 31, while deaths for July 23 this year were 32.

A total of 6,877 motorists were injured this year through May, while for the corresponding period in 1958 there were 6,350. Traffic accidents through May this year were 22,124, and for last year through May there were 21,391.
