Driver Licensing Study Completed

New York university has completed a two-year research project, under a grant from Shell Oil company, designed to aid in one of the important approaches to traffic safety by providing information on the basis of which driver licensing procedures can be improved.

The work—titled "Physical and Mental Requirements for the Driver's License"—is a compilation and analysis of state laws and regulations governing physical and mental standards to be met by applicants for the driver's license.

The booklet also contains recommended standards for these requirements as suggested by a medical-psychological symposium conducted under the auspices of the New York university, Bellevue Medical Center and the Center for Safety Education.

According to the center, the report is part of a comprehensive, three-year traffic safety research program made possible by a grant from Shell Oil company. This work last year developed the award-winning filmstrip "Perception of Driving Hazards," now in wide use in driver education classes throughout the country.

The study contains numerous charts depicting the different state requirements covering visual acuity, color vision, field of vision, physical defects, hearing, alcohol and drug addiction, age, diseases or ailments, and mental illness or incompetence.

According to the report there are wide variations among the states with regard to any particular type of requirement. For example, although the 50 states and the District of Columbia have specific minimum levels of visual acuity, they differ substantially in these levels. There is even less agreement on hearing standards. Moreover, although all 51 government jurisdictions refuse licenses to persons addicted to alcohol or suffering from mental disabilities,

The report points out finally that various research findings and recommendations of medical and psychological authorities, as well as certain provisions of the Uniform Vehicle code, apparently have had limited acceptance or application to date. Budgetary and other administrative problems are partly responsible for this fact.

Fruits, Vegetables Best for Freezing

Freeze recommended fruit and vegetable varieties, and you'll have better meals next winter, say food technologists at Oregon State college.

Last year, OSC tested more than 300 varieties of fruits and vegetables to learn how they stand up under processing. Not all varieties freeze well. Some get tough, lose flavor, color and texture, and others tend to develop undesirable flavors. Varieties suitable for processing are suggested for Oregon use by Mrs. Lois Sather, food technologist.

They include:

Apricots—Royal, Blenheim, Tilton, Wenatchee, Moorpark.

Blueberries and Huckleberries—Native Wild Blue and Red, Concord, Jersey, Dixie, Stanley, Blue Crop, Blueray, Earliblue.

Cherries, sour—Montmorency, Early Richmond, English Morello.

Cherries, sweet—Lambert, Bing, Deacon, Royal Ann, Republican, Van, Sam.

Figs—Mission, Kadota, Gillette, Granata, Lattarula, Black Spanish.

Grapes—Thompson Seedless, Worden, Campbell's Early, Concord.

Peaches—Elberta, Halehaven, Veteran, Triagem, J. H. Hale, Redhaven, Dixigem, Fairhaven, Coronet.

Beets—Detroit Dark Red, Early Model.

Strawberries—Marshall, Corvallis, Northwest, Brightmore, Sillet, Puget Beauty.

Green or Wax Beans—Blue Lake strains, Tendergreen, Stringless Green Pod, Wade, Processor, Columbia, Kentucky Wonder, Puregold Wax.

Corn, cut or on-the-cob—Carmelcross, Seneca Golden, Tendermost, Prosperity, Golden Cross Bantam. Many other popular varieties freeze with good results.

Summer Squash—Zucchini, Summer Crookneck.
