### Changes Made in Potato Standards

Malheur county potatoes will move with better maturity following action of the marketing agreement control committee July 24. R. K. Hart of Pocatello, secretary-manager for the marketing agreement, reports from poll of his members by telephone that the committee approved a regulation of slightly skinned for all varieties moving into the fresh market.

Regulations at the start of shipping required round red, early gem, and white rose potatoes to meet moderately skinned standards, and russets were set at slightly skinned. Recommendation for the change came from a meeting of the local shippers association with directors of Malheur Potato Growers association July 23, and points up the desire of the local industry to match quality and maturity with any district in the country.

Minimum size in the round red varieties was also raised to a 2-inch minimum diameter from 1 7/8 inches and the minimum grade set at U. S. No. 1 eliminating No. 2's in this variety. Present minimum sizes for early gem, white rose, and russet are set at 2-inch diameter.

Malheur county has been moving round reds and early gems of exceptional quality. Growers expected to be in full swing on white rose by Aug. 1, and start russets in volume the week of Aug. 10.
