Mrs. Durlin has been taking Mrs. Frank Bicandi to Nampa several days a week for medical treatments following a serious illness some time ago.

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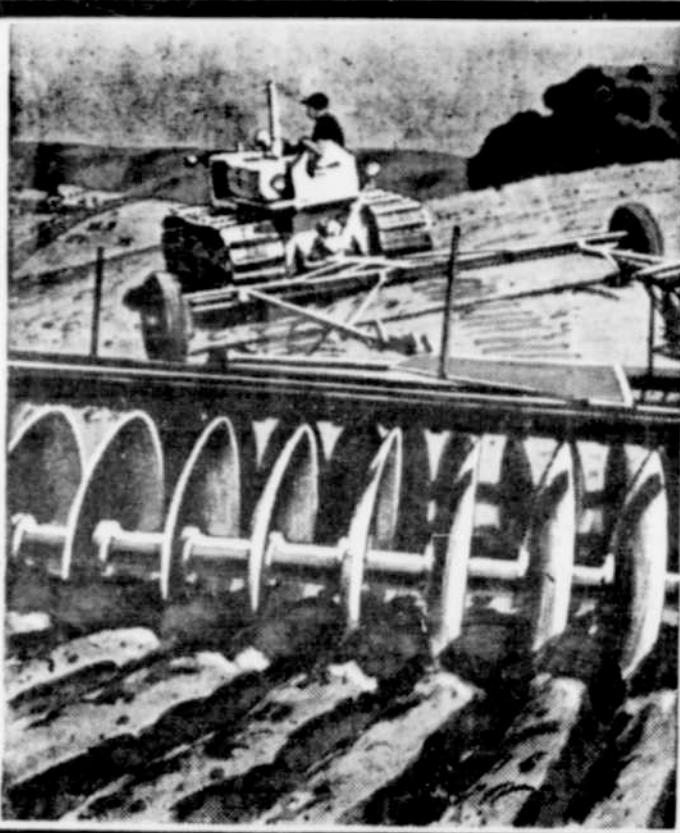
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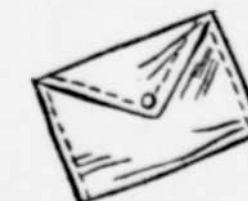


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
