Books dealing with different aspects of education head the list of new books going into circulation Saturday, Aug. 8, at the Malheur county library.

"Some of My Best Friends Are Professors" by George Williams combines warm-hearted sympathy for students and ruthless honesty about professors in a book which will have a tremendous impact upon the ordinary American idea about the university.

"Education of Exceptional Children and Youth" edited by William M. Cruickshank contains the writing of 11 foremost authorities combined to make a major contribution to the study of children with intellectual, physical and emotional difference and have provided a program for their development.

"Your Gifted Child" by Florence N. Brumbaugh explains how to determine your child's abilities and what to do to develop them.

"How to Raise Your Child's I.Q." by David Engler suggests certain procedures and tests designed to help the parent help the child.

"The Mentally Retarded in Society" by Stanley Powell Davies proposes to give those working with the mentally retarded, or studying the subject, a sympathetic understanding of the problems involved. He presents information about modern practices and indicates present and future needs for an adequate program.

"An Introduction to the Arts of Japan" by Peter C. Swann is a modern, well-illustrated introduction to all the arts of Japan.

"Esprit de Corps" by Lawrence Durrell is a light-hearted, amusing book about the hazards of diplomatic life abroad.

"The Privilege Was Mine" by Zinaida Schakovskoy, who was born a Russian princess, tells of life in Russia today as she saw it after an absence of 40 years.

"The Little World of Laos" by Oden Meeker tells of the culture, customs, history and people of Laos.

"The Pistol" by James Jones is set in Hawaii at the time of the bombing of Wheeler Field on Dec. 7, 1941. The novel focuses on the pistol that Richard Mast, an American soldier, has in his possession.

"The Tall Man" by A. M. Harris tells of the tall man, a protagonist who remains nameless, who is an Australian intelligence officer training Korean agents and frequently accompanying them on secret missions. The story pivots on one such mission from which the tall man and his friends do not return.

RADIO CONTROLLED CAR AT CENTENNIAL EXPOSITION
Firebird II—another member of the revolutionary series of General Motors experimental gas turbine cars—will be introduced Friday at the Oregon Centennial Exposition.

The four passenger family car which has amazed millions of persons in the United States, Europe and Canada will be exhibited during the balance of the Portland show, scheduled to close Sept. 17.

Introduction of Firebird II in Portland, it was announced, will provide visitors to the exposition an opportunity to obtain a first-hand glimpse of the first complete attempt to incorporate into both car and highway design such present-day accomplishments as two-way radio communication with television and "electronic brains."

The basic purpose of the car is to report to the public on GM's gas turbine progress and to provide a rolling laboratory for further research.

The car is designed for adaptability to use on an electronic highway of the future, a concept

Anti-Litter Law Effective Aug. 5

On Wednesday, Aug. 5, a new law became effective in Oregon making littering within 100 yards of any stream, lake, reservoir or pond or channel thereof, punishable by a fine of not more than \$50 upon conviction of any person not having a possessory interest in such land.

Following the lead of many states having similar laws, the 1959 legislature has now put teeth in Oregon's anti-litter program, thereby hoping to discourage the continuing promiscuous littering of Oregon's scenic spots.

Accepting its obligation to the National Anti-Litterbug program, the Oregon division of the Izaak Walton League of America supported the measure in its recent passage and now asks the cooperation of the public, and of law enforcement agencies, in giving the new law adequate publicity and consideration.

To Fight Littering

Signs that read "No Littering" will soon be seen alongside signs reading "No Smoking" in Oregon factories and industrial plants if the appeal of the Oregon division of Izaak Walton League of America is heeded by industrial management, according to Junior Eckley, anti-litterbug chairman of Salem.

Most littering is due to carelessness by persons who thoughtlessly toss candy wrappers, paper cups and other litter items onto floors and other places about plant premises. In addition to inducing a fire hazard by over accumulation, such tactics burden the clean-up and sanitation departments of the plant and add materially to the expense of these departments. The unsightliness of litter in any quantity detracts from the pleasantness of any surrounding.

It is a logical assumption, Eckley says, that persons who carelessly toss candy wrappers, paper cups, cigarette packages and similar debris on the floors of an industrial plant or factory are just as likely to toss a live cigarette or match in the same manner. "No Littering" signs can help in more ways than one.

of highway travel entirely possible.

By means of a television screen on the dashboard the driver would make contact with an operator in a control tower along the "Safety Highway." The operator would guide the driver into a high speed lane with a metallic strip in its center.

Once the electronic coils in the cones in the front end of the Firebird II establishes contact with the "beam" in the metallic strip, the car would be automatically controlled by the tower operator. The driver then folds the steering posts forward and enjoys the ride.

The dashboard screen has two panels, one for "internal communication" between car and driver (information he would normally receive from visible instruments relative to fuel supply, engine operation and temperature). It also reveals a radar pattern when he guides the car onto the electronic control strip for automatic steering. "External communication" from the control tower in his "autoway zone" also appears on this panel.

The other panel of the screen supplies normal television reception and two-way television communication with motels, other cars, etc. The rear view mirror is replaced by a small circular view screen on the left side of the dashboard which projects images picked up by a TV camera in the rear of the car.

Beneath the instrument panel is a water cooler and chilling chamber to provide cool water and a cooling chamber for food storage.

Body of the new Firebird II is constructed from titanium, a lightweight metal of great strength which is non-corrosive and immune to salt water and marine atmosphere. The luggage compartment deck and floor lift automatically, bringing the floor up to the height of a person's waist for easy loading.
