Books on English Language Usage Listed at Library

Books on the proper use of the English language head the list of new books going into circulation Saturday, Aug. 15, at Malheur county library.

"Watch Your Language" by Theodore M. Bernstein is a writer's guide to economical, accurate and vivid writing.

"A New Way to Better English" by Rudolf Fleisch is a volume in which the author attempts to give the reader a way of making the best of the language he uses and writes everyday.

In "American English" by Albert H. Marekwardt, a philologist at the University of Michigan advances a new interpretation of the American language. He sees it as a reflection of American psychology, culture and folkways.

"The Celts" by T. G. E. Powell. A section of black-and-white plates complements a brief but knowledgeable survey of the Celtic society and religion for both the student and general reader.

"European Travel Guide" by Harold Newman. This is the seventh edition of a leading guide to travel in all 15 countries of Western Europe, plus new chapters on Greece and Turkey.

"Reflections on the Psalms" by C. S. Lewis. The author raises important questions regarding the significance of the Psalms in the Bible and in the life of the contemporary Christian.

"More in Sorrow" by Wolcott Gibbs. Thirty-five parodies, pro-

files, short stories and theatrical reviews by the New Yorker's witty theater critic.

"In Every War But One" by Eugene Kinkead. A disturbing book that lays bare a failure in which we all share: Why one out of every three American's taken prisoner in Korea collaborated with the Communists, and why two out of five died, many at the hands of their fellow Americans.

"Ordeal" by John Prescott. A stage journey from Tucson to San Diego results in heroism and victory for some of the six passengers and torture, betrayal and death for others.

"My Caravaggio Style" by Doris L. Moore. This is a story of literary deception, told by the culprit himself, who attempts nothing less than a forgery of Lord Byron's burned memoirs.

"The Hours Before Dawn" by Celia Fremlin. A London schoolmistress, obsessed by the idea that the Henderson baby is her illegitimate son, begins a subtle persecution of Louise Henderson.

"Corridor of Honor" by Nicholas Fersen. A novel of courageous men fighting on without hope of home.

"Celia Garth" by Gwen Briston. Tells the story of a girl who lived in Charleston, S.C., during the American Revolution and the contribution she made as a spy for Marion, the "Swamp Fox."

"You've Got Him Cold" by Thomas B. Dewey. A recent Inner Sanctum mystery.

"Strike the Lutine Bell" by Victor H. Johnson. Explains that at Lloyd's of London the Lutine Bell is struck whenever a ship goes down at sea. When this powerful narrative of the death of the Amphitrite ends, the reader knows that the Lutine Bell will strike once more.

"Appointment on the Yellowstone" by Harry S. Drago is a western novel.

"The Fig Tree" by Aubrey Menen is the story of an earnest young scientist who is troubled by the enormous increase in the world's population and plans to devise some means of halting it, but discouraged from that project, later attempts to help mankind by bettering the food supply.

"Something Shared: Children and Books" by Phyllis Fenner contains stories revealing the inmost feelings of a child, articles on the joys and problems of reading, and on the importance of books in a child's background.

"A Passion for Books" by Lawrence Clark Powell is a collection of essays on the art of librarianship, which were written from 1948 through 1957, and have been revised more or less to give them unity in this book.

"Wilderness Men" by Howard O'Hagan is an account of ten men of the West — exiles — three Indians, seven white men, who met life alone, in the forests of the Pacific slopes, in the Rockies on the northern prairies or in the wastes of the Arctic. These stories deal with man's battle either with nature or with man.

"Letters To Mother" edited by Charles Van Doren contains letters by such people as Henry Adams, Prince Albert, Louisa M. Alcott, Samuel Johnson, Helen Keller, Susan B. Anthony, Czar Nicholas, and Marcel Proust, written to their mothers.

"The Admen" by Shepherd Mead is a novel about the men and women who are in the advertising business. Here is how they move to the top, how they stay there, and how, sometimes, they don't stay there.

"Summer Thunder" by Willie Snow Ethridge is a novel about the founding of Georgia.

"Hill Smoke" by L. P. Holmes tells the story of a lawman who
