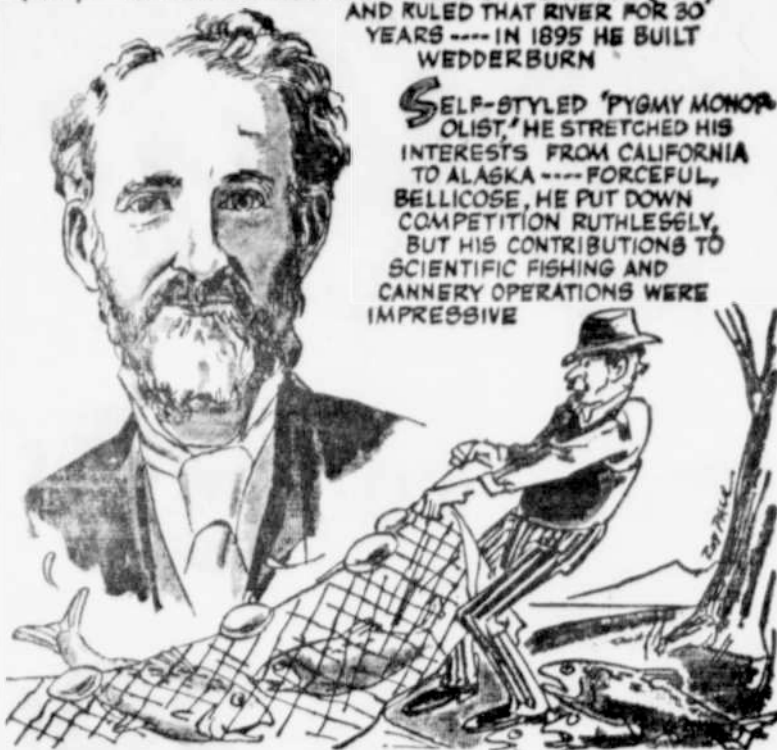

Deer Permits Are Available in All But Thirteen Areas

Unit deer permits for hunting either-sex deer during the latter part of the general deer season are available to hunters in all but 13 units and will be issued to applicants on a first come first serve basis.

Permits become valid for use from October 17 through 25 in all game management units. Several units have extensions of the general season November 14 and 15, at which time unsuccessful hunters with unused deer tags and valid permits may again try their luck. Season dates for all units may be found in the regulations synopsis.

The area units where available permits are filled are: Baker, Butte Falls, Coquille, Heppner, Ochoco, Paulina, Lookout Mtn., Metolius, Silver Lake, Trask, Wasco and Wilson.

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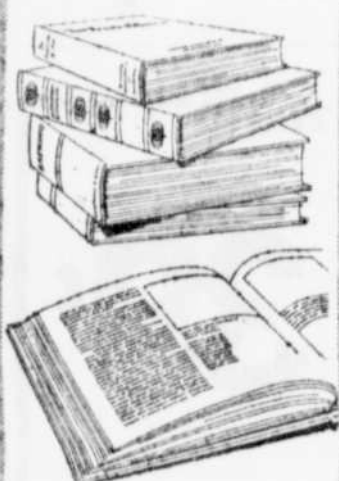
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SALE OF SAVING BONDS SHOW INCREASE IN COUNTY

July sales of U.S. savings bonds in Malheur county amounted to \$23,579, State Director G. W. Minnugh said today.

"Malheur county residents today own and hold more than \$5 million worth of Series E and H saving bonds, according to U.S. Treasury estimates," he continued and pointed out that "The July sales are an important part of a steady building up of personal savings reserves throughout the county.

"Many of these individuals who own savings bonds would probably have little or no savings at all if it were not for the convenient, easy methods of purchasing savings bonds at banks or through the payroll savings plan at the place where they work," the county chairman said.

He also announced that state savings bonds sales for the month totaled \$3,121,561 and noted that the savings bonds program during its 18-year history has built up a savings reserve of more than \$42 billion worth of E and H bonds held by more than 40 million Americans.

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
