Timber and Fish Are Grown in the Forests

Three Oregon industrial tree farmers have teamed up with the state's fish farmers to give sportsmen and commercial fishermen a helping hand.

The Oregon Fish commission has planted some 200,000 silver salmon fingerlings in a nine-acre natural rearing pond constructed in a cooperative undertaking by Weyerhaeuser Timber Co. and the commission on Weyerhaeuser's Millicoma tree farm near Coos Bay. This winter, when the fish have reached a size of up to six inches, they will be released to make room for next year's fry.

Menasha Plywood at North Bend is cooperating with the fish commission in a similar project on its lands. Fingerling salmon are growing on natural foods present in three Menasha ponds.

Pope & Talbot, Inc., Portland, is also working with commission biologists, and the company has made a four-acre natural rearing pond on its lands near Monroe for fish propagation.

Fish biologists say the idea of rearing fingerlings in natural ponds instead of hatcheries is relatively new in the United States, although it has been done for many years in other countries.

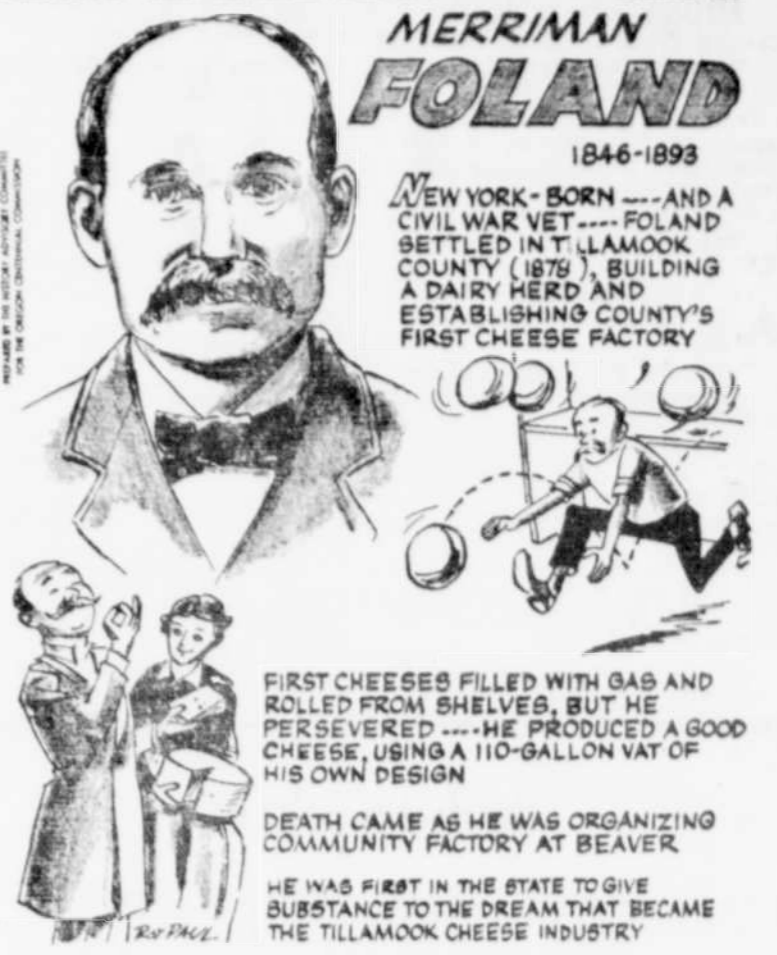
