

Morford Blames Fairs for Poor Turnout at Grid Practices

Coach Bob Morford Wednesday blamed the Malheur County Fair and the Western Idaho Fair for the relatively poor turnout for football practice this week.

Many prospects have been working all summer, he said, and are taking this last week before school starts to show livestock and projects at the fairs. He said he doesn't expect a full turnout until classes start next week.

The coach said 35 men turned out Monday night, the first practice of the year. Tuesday only 30 turned out, and six of these were out for the first time, meaning 11 of the first night's candidates failed to show up the second night.

Morford said sophomores will

see a lot of action this year—six husky sophomores turning out this week averaged 180 pounds each. With this statement, the coach took a look at the future.

"If we place toward the top this year," he said, "it will be due to fight and determination rather than weight and experience."

"Our line will average about 160 pounds, the backfield less than 150—It will take a lot of playing to overcome the lack of weight."

This year the Bulldogs play their first four games away and wind up the season with four games at home. The gridder will first see action at the conference jamboree at Ontario Sept. 11, and then open regular season play at Parma Sept. 12. The remaining schedule:

Adrian Grid Chief Sees Possibilities

Limited optimism was voiced by the new Adrian high school football coach Monday during the squad's first workout of the year.

"I think we'll have a good outfit," said Roy Buhler, "but I don't want to make any definite statements until I've worked with the squad."

Buhler took over the football post this fall from Glenn Ward, who was named principal of the 125-student high school.

Buhler said the Antelopes lost only four of last year's starting team, leaving a solid core of seven veterans to build around. One of the players lost was Fred Sayre, outstanding sophomore quarterback. Sayre is the son of Athol Sayre, former Adrian principal who moved this year to Elgin as school superintendent.

Buhler said he did not yet know what formation the team would run from, possibly a double or single wing. The Antelopes used a T-formation last year.

This is Buhler's first full-time coaching job, although he has coached community sports for several years.

The new coach graduated from Vale high school in 1952 and then entered Boise Junior College where he played two years of football. He spent from 1954 to 1956 in Great Britain on an LDS mission.

Buhler entered Brigham Young University upon his return to the United States, and graduated from that school in 1959 with a B.S. in physical education, and a minor in zoology. He also completed pre-therapy requirements.

The predatory animal catch in Oregon during July was 459 coyotes, 233 bobcats, 30 bears and 29 foxes—a grand total of 751.

Long in Malheur county with 122 coyotes, 39 bobcats and 85 badgers; second high was J. Chesley Hart, also in Malheur county, with 64 coyotes, 42 bobcats, 5 porcupine, 3 racoons and 70 badgers. Clarence E. Mullins, Yamhill county, was high individual hunter in western Oregon with 7 coyotes, 5 bobcats, 4 bears, 12 foxes and 6 racoons.
