"Istanbul" by Martin Hurlimann. After a brief but illuminating introduction to the city's remarkable history the book continues with more than 100 plates.

"Story of Ireland" by Brian Inglis. This book begins with an introductory chapter on the country today. From this, the author goes back in history to trace and examine the roots of present-day institutions and emotions.

"Soondar Mooni" by E. O. Sheb-bear presents the true story of the life of an Indian elephant.

"The Leaf and the Flame" by Margaret Porton, a former correspondent for the New York Herald Tribune, who recently spent five years in India, writes of her experiences in and attitudes toward this complex country.

"Treasure Divers of Vigo Bay" by John S. Potter. The story of the expedition organized by the author to recover the fabulous treasure sunk by the British in 1702 in Spain's Vigo Bay when a Spanish fleet from America was the victim.

"The Lion and the Rose" by Jane Oliver. A Scottish novelist's partisan interpretation of Mary Stuart's fateful years in Scotland which presents the queen as an ardent, spontaneous woman, too trusting for her own good, always ready to grant a pardon, accept a traitor's protestations of loyalty, and believe the best of everyone.

"The Land Beyond the Mountains" by Janice Holt Giles. A novel of the Kentucky frontier.

"Face in the Clouds" by John Gilbert Harrison. Paul and Vicki Denham, assigned to Singapore because of Paul's new job in the postwar British Navy, are happily married but the appearance of Teddy Charlton, a former beau

of Vicki's, causes some complications.

"Side Door to Heaven" by Alan Gillies. This is the story of the turbulent Freeman family over two decades, as reflected by the adventures—real and imaginary—of its most impressionable member, Harley Freeman.

"Making Progress" by Anthony Bailey. Naive, irrepressible English Slater vacations at a Swiss resort where he meets an Arabian agent for a dubious Mid-East commercial organization and his attractive companion. Oblivious of being middleman in an international intrigue, he is commissioned to undertake a secret mission to Poland and is also offered money by a British agent not to make the trip. He suc-

ceeds, however, in keeping the trust of both agents.

"Bespeken Mile" by Peggy Morrison. The story of a London cabaret girl who leaves the theater when she inherits a lovely house in Scotland. Here she discovers a strange eerie world and love.

"Ride the Long Night" by E. A. Alman is a western novel telling the story of Will Storm who had sworn he could not rest until his gun caught up with the three people who betrayed him.

A Knot of Roots by Elizabeth DeVegh. This is a novel about two worlds, one colored, one white. They are linked by two main characters, both seeking a new life in the countryside near New York.

Food Stamp Program Approved by House

Legislation authorizing a national food stamp program was approved last week by the House of Representatives. The program will make surplus food available to millions of elderly, disabled and needy Americans.

Congressman Al Ullman (D-Ore.) hailed the food stamp program as "an effective means to alleviate human need throughout the country. 'It is unconscionable,' Ullman said, 'to allow low income citizens to subsist on substandard diets while our warehouses bulge with farm surpluses. The food stamp program, if effectively administered by the secretary of agriculture, will do

much to provide a better standard of living for millions."

Ullman pointed out that existing food disposal programs are largely concentrated in urban areas of high unemployment. "The food stamp program, however, will provide foodstuffs for any person on old age assistance or any family in want in any area of the country—urban or rural."

The House-approved food stamp plan permits the secretary of agriculture to distribute surplus food to the states and to issue food stamps to state and local welfare departments. These stamps would be given to needy people and would be redeemable in normal food retail outlets.

The House bill now goes to the Senate for consideration.

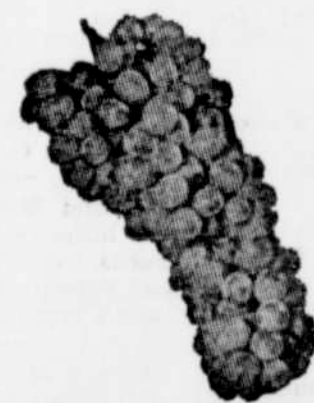
