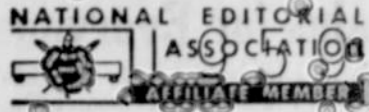

The Right Spirit

Despite the tremendous pressure brought on our lawmakers by labor leaders, the Griffin-Andrum labor bill passed both houses by a big majority. No union wanted any labor bills passed, and lots of all this particular bill, has had enough to run rough shod over many non-union firms, through their blackmail picketing, second-hand boycotts, and "hot cargo" practices.

People demanded a change and there being so many people then there were union members, they were led by the voice of change necessary to curb the unions. Not all people took a great deal of interest in the matter. Apparently our Congressman Ullman did not hear from his constituents as he did not vote for the curbing of labor. Only one of the Oregon congressmen did vote for the bill, according to the September issue of the Teamster magazine, and that was Walter Norblad of the First District. When he was asked by an Oregon longshoreman what he thought of the bill, he replied, "It is my personal belief that there are a number of reforms needed in the labor-management field. One is a bill of rights to entitle members to equal rights of the meetings, protest union dues, and to be paid fairly; and our union officials who deny their own rights. It is my further belief that the secondary boycott is illegal and should be outlawed, and the union is free of the secondary boycott and not so on. You are not only welcome to read this letter to your congressman, but I hope you will do so as I would like to hear of your views in this matter."

Change is really the place where it became apparent that a change was needed so badly. The Dave Beck episode was the first big factor bringing the abuses to light. When his successor, Hoffa, did as much as any other thing to turn public opinion against the unions continuing their operations as permitted by law. It is doubly hard to maintain any Oregonian who is feeling so many people who work in demanding the strong law. They will have their own views if you could class them as regular. The people need to speak more often.

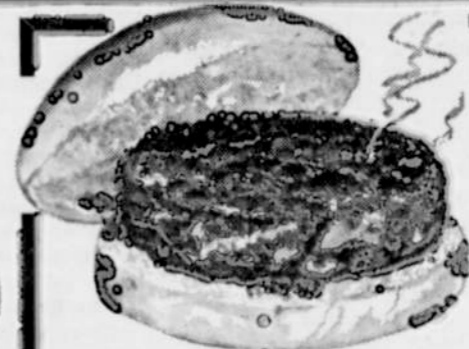
