State Parks Close At Various Times

Generally, state parks are never closed to the public. However, weather conditions govern whether or not some facilities and areas may be made available for use. Snow conditions also may close access to parks, especially in high altitude central and eastern Oregon and in the Cascades.

In the winter of each year park water systems are drained prior to freezing weather. Thus, drinking water may not be available and rest room facilities closed for a period of time.

Along the Oregon coast the above may be true for only a short period as compared with the eastern section of the state. Electricity for public buildings and for operation of electric cooking stoves is also shut off in the fall and stoves stored for the winter as well as some tables.

The overnight camping season varies somewhat among those parks having this type of development. Generally, the season is from May into October. Weather and public demand are accountable for a variation of opening and closing dates. Every effort is made to keep facilities open during the hunting season in those sections of the state where hunting occurs and it is at all feasible to do so.

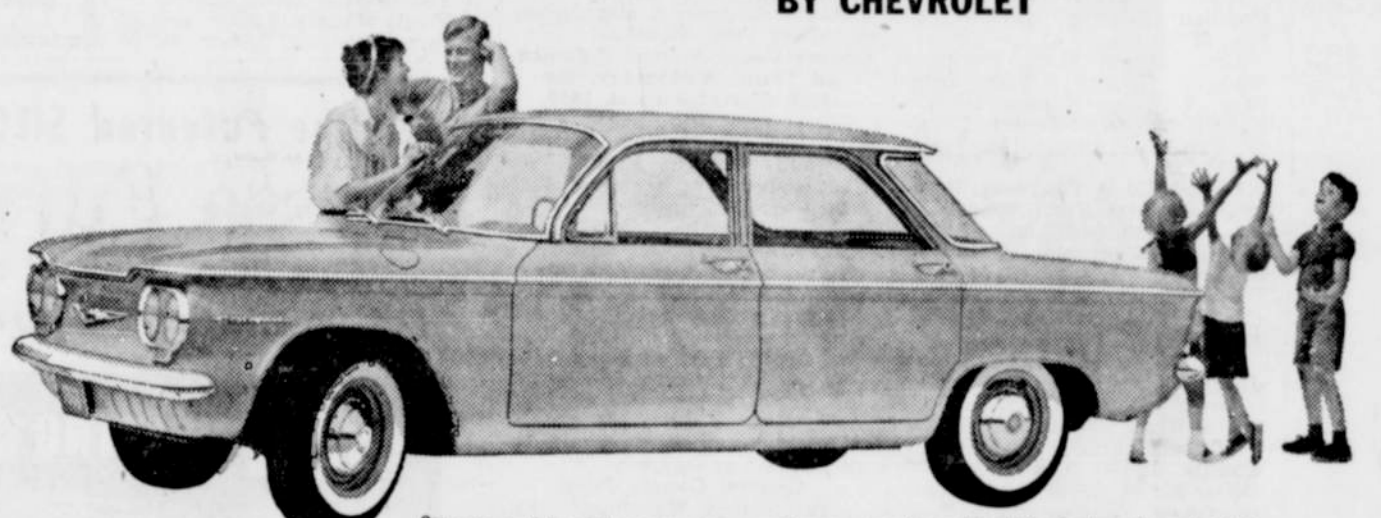
