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Rules for Raising Delinquent Children

(Editor's Note: The police department of Houston, Texas, issued a leaflet recently with the above title. We think it speaks for itself more eloquently than any introduction we could give it.)

- 1. Begin with infancy to give the child everything he wants. In this way he will grow up to believe the world owes him a living.
2. When he picks up bad words, laugh at him. This will make him think he's cute. It will encourage him to pick up "cuter" phrases that will blow off the top of your head later.
3. Never give him any spiritual training. Wait until he is 21 and then let him decide for himself.
4. Avoid the use of the word "wrong." It may develop a guilt complex. This will condition him to believe later, when he is arrested for stealing a car, that society is against him and he is being persecuted.
5. Pick up everything he leaves lying around—books, shoes and clothing. Do everything for him so that he will be experienced in throwing responsibility on others.
6. Let him read any printed matter he can get his hands on. Be careful that the silverware and drinking glasses are sterilized, but let his mind feast on garbage.
7. Quarrel frequently in the presence of your children; this way they will not be too shocked when the home is broken up.
8. Give a child all the spending money he wants. Never let him earn his own. Why should he have things as tough as you had them?
9. Satisfy his every craving for food, drink and comfort. See that every sensual desire is gratified. Denial may lead to harmful frustration.
10. Take his part against neighbors, teachers, policemen. They are all prejudiced against your child.
11. When he gets into real trouble, apologize for yourself by saying, "I never could do anything for him."
12. Prepare for a life of grief. You will likely have it.

A Six-Point Program To Cut Traffic Deaths

A six-point "how to stop the rising death toll" program was recommended by the National Safety Council's traffic conference this summer:

- 1. Every state and city traffic enforcement agency should check its enforcement index and, where it is low, take immediate steps to increase it.
2. Every highway department should immediately investigate high accident locations and take action wherever a need is indicated.
3. Every driver license authority should take immediate action to restrict, suspend or revoke licenses of all accident and violation prone drivers.
4. Every court should take immediate steps to analyze its schedule of penalties to determine whether they are actually having the desired deterrent and educational effect.
5. Every state and community should step up public education activities directed toward "know how, skills and attitudes" needed for safety.
