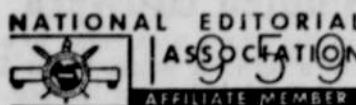

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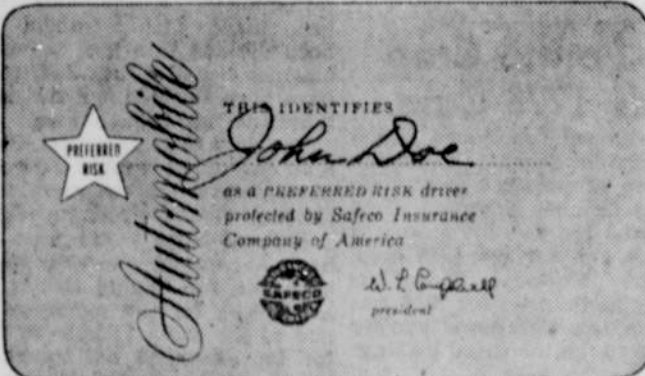
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From This Corner...

Religious Census Starts This Week

A religious census, (beginning this week), is being taken in Nyssa and surrounding countryside. Teams representing the Nyssa Ministerial Association will do the work during the next several months. The purpose of the census will be to contact every single family in the community to accurately ascertain the religious picture of the community. This census is being conducted by the Ministerial Association as a service to the community, and when completed, the statistics of the census will be published. No names will be released, however, so that no one will be embarrassed in any way.

The captain of the census teams will be Robert Kriner. The director of the census project for the Ministerial Association will be Earl Hastings. The President of the Ministerial Association is the Rev. William Woodman.

The last religious census taken here by the Ministerial Association was completed in 1956. The church preference at that time was as follows:

Land owners 67.7 percent, tenants, 32.3 percent.
Protestant, 53.7 percent, LDS, 25.8 percent, Roman Catholic, 9.5 percent, none, 9.6 percent, Buddhist, 1.4 percent, refused to answer, 1 percent, complaints one person.

The Ministerial Association was very grateful for the high degree of cooperation and goodwill, evidenced in the last census. This year's census will not include the questions concerning land ownership since we had one complaint in 1956 on this. The census teams will be seeking information only, with questions concerning church membership or preference and attendance. The census teams are working on a non-denominational basis and will not interfere in any way with religious faith or freedom.
