"Air Forces of the World" by William Green. A factual guide, arranged alphabetically by country, to the history, strength, equipment and bases of every Air Force in existence today.

"Gemstones of North America" by John Sinkankas. Complete and authoritative, this volume combines accurate geological and mineralogical information with detailed descriptions of gem localities for the field collector.

"A Good Time to Be Alive" by Edgar Ansel Mowrer. In spite of the title, this is a worried and urgent call to Americans to think—and to act—now on national issues at home and abroad. The author considers this a good time to be alive in that both present and future are exciting, but he believes that laziness, anti-intellectualism and conformity have the upper hand over freedom, liberty and individualism.

"Five Ideas That Changed the World" by Barbara Ward Jackson. An English authority writes with clarity and vision about the impact of nationalism, industrialism, colonialism, communism and internationalism on the modern world.

"Warriors of God" by Walter Nigg. The story of various religious orders and their founders.

"Things That Go Bump in the Night" by Louis C. Jones. Taking some 200 of the ghost stories collected by students in his folklore classes, the author has woven them into a connected discussion of ghosts and ghostlore.

"Wonders of the World" by Leonard Cottrell takes the reader on two imaginary journeys, first to visit the seven wonders of the ancient world, and then to seven triumphs of engineering, archi-
