In the Oregon campaign for the
reduction of traffic accidents we
have found education the first re-
quirement. The training of young
people, not only in knowledge of
the mechanical operation of a car
but in the higher mental processes
of responsible driving, has always
resulted in fewer accidents—some
say half as many accidents among
the trained as among the untrain-
ed.

There is another form of edu-
cation which comes from organiz-
ed effort. We believe that the
constant dissemination of appeals
and warnings provides the neces-
sary elements of incentive and
"alarm." We must thoughtfully
and considerably obey regula-
tions, avoid hazards and practice
the Golden Rule.

We do find an increased pleas-
ure in driving through prevention.
We are justified in fearing traffic
accidents with their tragic conse-
quences.

There is a formula—responsible
driving on the part of the individ-
ual, and support by the individ-
ual of organized traffic preven-
tion—that does bring about a re-
duction in the number and cost of
accidents.

To hold that they become fewer
"due to the good sense of our
people... without any prodding"
is an absurdity.

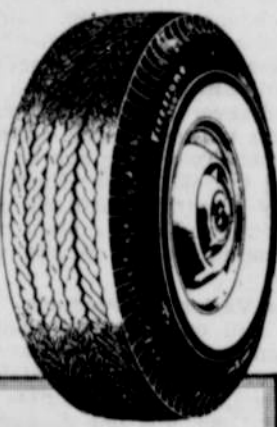
