

Knife and Fork Club To Hear Kazmayer

An inside glance of what is presently going on internationally and what our State department is going to do about the many confusing conditions here and abroad, will be the main course set before members of the Knife and Fork dinner club at their meeting Saturday evening, Jan. 9, 1960, at the East Side cafe in Ontario.

Serving the tasty dish will be Robert Kazmayer, author, lecturer and analyst, just back from another summer journey to Europe and the Middle East where he observed startling and changing conditions and the attitude of the men on the street toward the United States and its activities.

Kazmayer was born in Rush, New York, in November, 1908. He went to school in western New York and then attended the University of Rochester and the Colgate Divinity school. He had intended to make the Methodist ministry his life's work and did,



as a matter of fact, fill several churches in and about Rochester. In 1938, he resigned from the Greenstone Methodist church in order to devote his entire time to writing and speaking.

The world is quite a familiar place to Bob Kazmayer. He goes abroad every summer now but before he started conducting the Kazmayer Seminar Tours, he used to wander about quite a bit. One year would find him in South America, a second in Asia and a third in Africa and a fourth in Europe. He writes a monthly news letter which he publishes under the title of "Things to Watch and Watch For."

More Big Game Hunters in 1959

Big game hunters who had a difficult time in locating hunting areas isolated from other sportsmen during the 1959 seasons have good reason to bemoan the fact that everywhere they went the "woods were full of hunters."

Incomplete reports from license agents throughout the state indicate there were more big game hunters afield during the 1959 seasons than ever before. Big game tag sales through Oct. 31 show a substantial increase in the number of deer tags issued, and the number of elk tags is expected to exceed or at least equal last year's high.

Tallies through October by the game commission show a total of 242,790 deer tags were issued, exceeding last year's record sales by more than 10,000 tags. The total deer tag sales for 1959 is expected to reach around 244,000. Last year 233,885 deer tags were issued.

Incomplete reports from license dealers disclose the sale of 36,541 elk tags, which is above the sales reports at this time last year.
