Works by Well-Known Entertainers Head New Books at County Library

Books by popular stage personalities head the group going into circulation Saturday, Jan. 16, at Malheur county library.

"Groucho and Me" by Groucho Marx. Groucho quips his way through some recollections of childhood, vaudeville, movies, radio and TV.

"With Powder on My Nose" by Billie Burke. The well-known actress, still gay and delightful as a grandmother, gives her ideas on love, treatment of husbands, chorus girls, fashions and other topics.

"Tomorrow the Moon" by Abraham Marcus. A simplified explanation for the general reader of man-made satellites, guided and ballistic missiles and space stations.

"Indians of the High Plains" by George E. Hyde. A history of the Indians of the High Plains areas from the pre-historic period to 1800.

"My Unwelcome Guests" by Frederick S. Baldi. Explosive views on capital punishment, juvenile delinquency and prison riots based on 40 years "inside" by a warden and doctor.

"The Special Diet Cook Book" by James R. Wilson. Complete cook book for the seven major classes of restricted diets.

"Food: America's Biggest Business" by Pauline Arnold. An in-

formative book with chapters on history of cereals, baking industry, meat business and food manufacturers.

"Little Railways of the World" by Frederic Shaw. Selected tales of world-wide miniature railroad lines.

"Betrayal" by Ethel E. Tighe. Here is a penetrating novel, with an Idaho setting, that dramatizes today's crisis in American education and culture.

"The Hour Glass" by Edwin

Gilbert. A large, occasionally over-written novel traces the 20 year Greenwich village-suburban cycle of a group of men and women who in 1936 share poverty, bad luck and Bohemian antics in a run-down apartment house.

"One Hour" by Lillian Smith. David Landrum, an Episcopal minister in a southern community, chronicles a series of tragic events set in motion when his closest friend, a brilliant scientist, is unjustly accused of molesting a small girl.

"Complete Short Stories" by Nathaniel Hawthorne. Seventy-two tales of fantasy and imagination.

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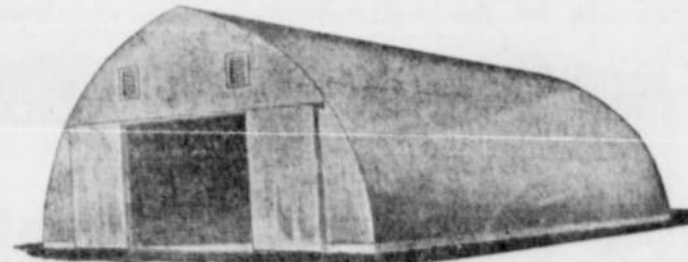
