

Nyssa Hoopsters Defeat Mac-Hi 56-43, Drop League Game to Parma Friday

Bulldogs Take Victory From Host Pioneers In District Clash Sat.

Breaking loose in the fourth quarter, the Nyssa Bulldogs posted a 56-43 win over the home-standing Mac-Hi Pioneers in a district 7-A2 tilt Saturday night at Milton-Freewater.

After Nyssa scored the first point on a free shot by Gary Dail the lead changed hands several times with the two teams deadlocked 11-11 at first quarter's end.

The lead continued to alternate until halftime when the Bulldogs squeezed ahead to a 22-20 lead. In the third stanza the visitors jumped to a six-point lead as the quarter closed with the score 37-31.

The Bulldogs broke loose with about four minutes to play in the final period to put the game out of reach and the game ended with Nyssa in command 56-43.

Brothers Gary and Jack Dail canned 15 and 11 points respectively to lead the Bulldogs. Dave Jordan was high for Mac-Hi with 19. Nyssa: Moore 2, Meyers 9, Stoneberg 10, Walker 9. Mac-Hi: Douglas 5, Perkins 9, Jordan 19, Mason 9, Wilson 1.

Handing the Bulldogs their second straight SRV-A league setback, the visiting Parma Panthers dropped their hosts 44-33 Jan. 15.

Paced by Larry Engleking, the Panthers grabbed a 14-4 first period lead. The Bulldogs finally hit the basket with six minutes to go in the second quarter and narrowed the Panther margin to 22-20 at halftime.

Parma lengthened the gap in the third quarter as Nyssa hit for only six counters to end the stanza 33-26 in Parma's favor.

The visitors then went ahead in the final period to win 44-33, thus dropping the Bulldogs into league second place with five wins and three losses.

Slide Rule Classes Offered at NHS

Slide rule classes are now being held for students of Nyssa senior high school. This is a non-credit short term course in slide rule instruction. There are now 17 enrolled and the classes are being conducted by W. A. Barton, industrial arts instructor at NHS, from 4 to 4:45 p.m. and will continue for 11 lessons.

A similar short term course is also being held for students who are unable to attend the after-school classes. These sessions are being held on Tuesday mornings at 8 o'clock. These classes will continue until the nine scales on the slide rule have been thoroughly explained. Barton says, "The slide rule is as accurate as the person using it and the answers obtained through the use of the rule are accurate to three significant places."

Answers obtained by the use of the slide rule are acceptable in the chemistry and physics department at the high school, according to Charles Steffens, instructor in those departments.

The common name for the slide rule, according to users, is "slip stick."
