2500 Intoxicated Oregon Drivers Convicted in 1959

Last year 181,405 Oregonians were convicted of traffic violations. This was the highest ever recorded for one year and was about 12 percent higher than for 1958, according to recent reports of the Department of Motor Vehicles. Of the total, 2,500 were convicted of driving while intoxicated, calling for mandatory license suspension.

In addition to suspensions for this cause, more than 5,200 lost their licenses temporarily due to court recommendation or discretionary action of licensing officials. This total included more than 1,700 drivers whose records were considered unsafe.

Of the estimated 500 drivers involved in fatal accidents only two were suspended because of negligent homicide convictions during the year.

On the property damage side of the picture, it was estimated that the cost to Oregon was \$65½ million, or more than \$171,000 per day. This figure included wage loss, medical expense and increased insurance costs.

"Public support for needed legislation and sound official accident prevention efforts are ways people can contribute toward improving these conditions," declared Vern L. Hill, chairman of the Oregon Traffic Safety commission.

Quarter Million Youth Hear Series Giving Advice on Dating, Marriage

In a giant campaign conducted by the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (Mormon), approximately a quarter of a million youth are receiving instruction designed to "protect them against tendencies toward delinquency."

The move was launched early in January with a closed circuit and tape-recorded address by 86-year-old Church President David O. McKay to youth assembled in 169 centers throughout the nation and outside its borders.

Area youth from wards in the Nyssa stake—Vale, Ontario, Nyssa First and Second, Owyhee and Parma—gathered in the stake house here for the "fireside."

"Never let us lose sight of the fundamental fact that the home is the basis of civilization, and that we have the obligation to build ideal homes and to put forth every effort to rear exemplary families," President McKay told his great audience of 12-through-26-year-old listeners.

Each Sunday evening, through March 27, a high ranking church leader will continue the theme in broadcasts over radio station KSL in Salt Lake City, which will be picked up by more than a score of cooperating stations throughout the west. Outside the range of these broadcasts, advance tape recordings of the talks will be made available for release concurrently with the radio addresses.

The young people, assembled in upwards of 5000 "firesides," will listen to the talks and then conduct their own discussions on the subject of the evening.

Subjects covered will include adherence to high standards of conduct, responsibilities of young men and women to each other in social dating, guarding against the evils of "petting" and "necking," the problem of "going steady," and guideposts to and preparation for the right kind of marriage.

In addition to the continental United States, groups in Hawaii, Canada, Mexico and New Zealand are also participating in the mammoth program.
