County health officer, Dr. Grant B. Hughes said Wednesday that influenza and hepatitis were prevalent in the county, along with quite a number of mumps cases. He said the reported cases of will be the signal for them to stop hepatitis were on the downgrade but that influenza was so widespread that it could be classed as epidemic.

Dr. Hughes' advice concerning flu was simply that all residents should see their physician and get flu shots before the disease is contracted. It is like the common cold in that it is much easier to prevent than to cure.

The health officer says that practically everyone in the county has been exposed to hepatitis and there may be many mild cases walking around unrecognized today. He advises that there are certain precautions all may take to cut down the chance of getting the disease and that there is a recommended treatment once it has been contracted. These were all given by Dr. Hughes and carried on the front page of the Dec. 17 issue of the Journal.
