White is married and the father of four children, is a property owner and taxpayer of the county and has been a resident for fifteen years. He came here as an associate of John Smeed as manager and auctioneer of the Ontario Livestock Commission company and has been active most of that time as an auctioneer of livestock and farm equipment. During that time he has been active in the Auction Operators association of Oregon, the National Livestock Auction Market, the Oregon Cattlemen's association, the Oregon Woolgrowers association and the Malheur Stock Growers association.

Onion Growers Organization Plans Wide Range Progress, Outlook Report At Annual Meeting Feb. 2 in Ontario

Progress with mechanical harvest and handling of onions, disease research and crop outlook reports will highlight the 1960 annual meeting of onion growers in Ontario Feb. 2, according to Turner Bond, secretary of Malheur Onion Growers association.

Southwest Idaho growers and the Malheur association will meet together for the annual conclave, which will start at 9:30 a.m. at the East Side cafe. The associations will be hosts for the lunch at noon.

Program chairman Joe Saito of Ontario reports that a wide range of topics of current interest to the onion industry will be covered in the day-long program.

Machine Users to Report

Early steps in mechanical harvest and handling of onions will be reported by several local growers who have used machines in harvest. Truman Barlow of Vale will lead this part of the discussion.

Onion disease research reports will include the plans for local trials in control of pink root as reported by Wilford Hess of Oregon State college. Dr. Ed Vaughn, also of Oregon State, will summarize all information on neck rot control gained in four years of local trials.

Allen Henry of the Portland office, USDA, will report on prospects for acreage and market outlook for onions in the coming year. Henry has secured assistance of Kenneth Schaible of the Washington, D.C., office of Agricultural Marketing service in pro-

Seven Seek Title of County Judge; Sheriff Post Attracts Four Hopefuls; Four Are Unopposed in Early Listings

According to records in the office of County Clerk J. Homer Schnell, Monday afternoon, a total of seven candidates had filed for the office of county judge, four for the position of sheriff, and four incumbents had filed without opposition at that time for the Oregon May 20 primary election.

The five Republican aspirants for the office of county judge are Frank Elfering, Vale, present deputy sheriff under his brother, John; Earl Bopp, Ontario, former mayor of that city but presently associated with a construction company there; Mary Finlay Graham, Vale, insurance agent and present justice of the peace for the Vale district; Earl Flock of Harper, rancher; and Ellis A. White, Ontario, known throughout the county for his auctioneering.

Democrats having filed are A. F. Peters, Ontario justice of the peace; and Harold R. Newman, Adrian grade school principal.

For sheriff there have been two Democrats and two Republicans file. The Democrats are O. D. Fulwiler, a farmer who ran in 1956; Robert Gordon Ingram, Vale, a law enforcement officer for the past 13 years and now Vale chief of police.

The Republicans are John C. Elfering, Vale, present sheriff, and Wilbur Atkins, Vale, presently occupied as a carpenter.

The incumbents who have drawn no opposition at this time are Ameil Claude, Republican county commissioner, G. H. Van Horn, Republican county treasurer; John Koopman, Democratic county assessor, and J. Homer Schnell, Democrat, county clerk.

Rescue Breathing Respiration Method Viewed, Discussed at C of C Meeting

No business was transacted at the Wednesday meeting of the Nyssa Chamber of Commerce. Following the noon meal, a film on "Rescue Breathing" was shown by Chuck Smith, administrator of Malheur Memorial hospital.

Prior to the showing, Dr. David Sarazin made a brief introduction for the film. He said it was erroneously referred to as a new method whereas it was actually the oldest reviving method known and had merely been relegated to the background and replaced by the "prone" method and later "arm-lift" technique, until research for the army during the past two years had shown that it was far superior to the other two methods.

Dr. Sarazin explained that it might be the first step in saving a life, could easily be learned by anyone and required no special equipment for use.

Science Teachers Make Final Plans For Regional Fair

The Treasure Valley Science Teachers association held a regular monthly meeting Monday evening at Parma. Dr. Lyle Stanford of the biology department of the College of Idaho met with the teachers from high schools in the area. He discussed affiliation of this science region with the National Science Fair association.

The group also made final plans for the Treasure Valley Science fair to be held at Emmett Feb. 27. Charles Steffens, Nyssa high science instructor who is on the planning committee for the exhibition at Emmett, stated that approximately 20 science students from Nyssa will participate in the competition for prizes awarded for science projects.

The Rev. Paul Ludlow of Nyssa, a former science instructor, will judge biology projects Feb. 27. The Treasure Valley Science fair will be open to the public from 2 until 5 p.m. and everyone interested is urged to attend.

Can Be Used Without Delay

The film demonstrating use of the method was developed through the anesthesiologists of the United States and was made during 1958. It stresses that the method can be used almost any place and without delay at a time when seconds may be the difference between life and death.

The technique calls for placing the victim on back with face up, tilt head back, insert finger into side of mouth and pull jaw forward to prevent tongue from closing throat, pinch nostrils to prevent air leaking through, seal off victim's mouth by placing mouths together, then literally blowing oxygen into the mouth. The latter is done by breathing twice as deeply as normally, because the person administering aid is breathing for two people. As few as 12 respirations per minute at regular intervals are usually sufficient. One should observe the rise of the chest while breathing air into the victim. The job may be accomplished in very few breaths or it may take hours.

Bible Proves Age of Technique

If the victim is recovering, he will show signs of having the color restored to the fingernails, lips and face.

The film used as proof that it was the oldest known method of artificial respiration by citing the Bible. II Kings, chapter 4, verse 32-35 records the death of a child and the restoration by Elisha. The method is described in verse 34 by saying, "And he went up, and lay upon the child, and put his mouth upon his mouth, and his eyes upon his eyes, and his hands upon his hands: and he stretched himself upon the child; and the child waxed warm."

County Grand Jury Indicts 14 Cases, Finds 2 'Not True'

Malheur county grand jurors completed their investigations at about 4:30 Tuesday afternoon and were dismissed by Circuit Judge Jeff Dorroh after commending them for a job well done.

The jury was in session Monday and Tuesday, and according to District Attorney E. Otis Smith, investigated 16 matters, returned 14 indictments and found two not-true bills.

Of the 14 true bills, four were on check charges of obtaining property by false pretenses against Dick Hodge, 47, of Gooding, Idaho; two were on check charges of obtaining money by false pretenses against Art East, 57, of Westfall; one against Charles Davis, 57, Ontario, for entering a motor vehicle with intent to steal; and the other one against Gary Merrill, 18, Ontario, for assault and battery.

More Names Available Thursday

The other six of the true bills were secret. They remain so until the persons charged have been taken into custody and arraigned before the court, according to the district attorney. He said there would be some more names available by Thursday noon as they would be formally charged by then.

Of the two not true bills, one was against County Commissioner Ameil Claude who had been charged with assault with a dangerous weapon, and the other one remains a secret, according to Smith. He says this is because the charge was found untrue and the record is destroyed so that the public may never know there was an investigation as to his guilt or innocence.

(Editor's note: In the Marez case, in which the public of Nyssa was so interested and which it was announced the grand jury would investigate, there is no official information available. However, at 3 p.m. Wednesday, shortly after getting the grand jury report from Smith, a member of the Journal staff found the driver of the death car, Guy W. "Buz" Blunck, at the home of his mother at 703 North First, Nyssa. This was almost 24 hours after the jury had been dismissed and Blunck said he had no report on the action of the jury.)
