

### Nyssa Regains SRV-A League Lead By Virtue of Three Wins During Week

#### Bulldogs Post 48-45 Victory Over Emmett Tuesday Night for 7-2 Win-Loss Hoop Record

Sliding past the visiting Emmett Huskies, the Nyssa Bulldogs pulled a 48-45 conference win out of the fire here Tuesday night. The win gives Nyssa a 7-2 SRV-A league record, again putting them in first place percentage wise over the Ontario Tigers who have a 6-2 record. Both teams played a slow but close first quarter that saw neither score until six minutes remained in the period. Nyssa managed to hold a slight edge as the quarter ended with a 10-8 score.

### Warriors Drop 50-36 Skirmish to Bulldogs

Nyssa's fighting Bulldogs scalped the Meridian Warriors 50-36 Saturday, Jan. 23, to keep a tie for league first place with the Ontario Tigers.

Nyssa held only a scant 7-6 edge over the host Meridian squad at first quarter's end but pulled ahead to a 20-11 tally as the teams left the floor at halftime.

The fuse was lit as the Nyssa five raced to a 33-22 third quarter lead. The fire remained as the Bulldogs kept their lead and the final buzzer sounded with the score reading 50-36.

Jack Meyers collected 15 points to lead the victorious visitors, while Reed Teuscher was high for the Warriors with 14.

The Bulldogs maintained their lead through the second quarter. At one time the Pirates fought to within four points when the score tallied 25-21 but the hosts pulled ahead and left the floor with a 34-25 halftime lead.

Consistent long shots by Payette's Floyd Rich and Larry Bergman were not enough in the third quarter as Nyssa upped the margin to 49-39.

High scoring Jack Dail fouled out in the final seconds of the game but not before he had put the game out of reach. He led the winners with 17 points and his brother Gary was close behind with 15. Rich topped the scores by getting 21 for Payette.
