

Funeral Services Held For Mrs. N. Bennett

Nettie Roberts Bennett was born Sept. 18, 1897 in Hubbard City, Texas. In 1912 she was married to Charles H. Bennett with whom she lived until his death in 1950. They homesteaded in Colorado in 1915, and moved to the Nyssa area in 1935.

One daughter died in infancy and another daughter, Eunice, died in 1941. Of the immediate family, Fred E. Bennett of Nyssa is the only survivor.

Also surviving are two sisters and one brother, John Roberts, Nina Baker and Letres Williamson, all of New Mexico.

Mrs. Bennett was active in local civic and political affairs. She was past noble grand of Rebekah lodge No. 202, past president of the ladies auxiliary of Legion post No. 79, a charter member of the Chatterbox club and a member of the Federated Garden club.

She united with the Methodist church in 1944 under the ministry of the Rev. M. H. Greenlee. She was an active member of the Methodist W.S.C.S.

Mrs. Bennett had been in poor health for several years and in the past year has put up a gallant fight against the impossible odds of diabetes, cancer, heart trouble and finally pneumonia. She died at noon January 20 at Malheur Memorial hospital.

Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. Saturday at Lienkaemper chapel, with the Rev. Paul Ludlow of the Nyssa Methodist church officiating. Concluding services were held at the Nyssa cemetery under the direction of the Yellow Rose Rebekah lodge.

Mr. White says he has traveled over almost every mile of road in the county and through his association with the farmers and ranchers knows of their problems and believes the experience he has gained would stand him in good stead as county judge. He says, if elected, he would devote his full time to the job and would bring leadership, direction and dignity to the county court.

He further says that it is imperative that the county court adopt a planned system of roads through the study and recommendations of the county planning committee and to make use of every source of revenue from all agencies to make the most efficient and economical road system possible.

Mr. White says that he has some very definite ideas as to what should be done in the juvenile field, and no doubt, will make these known to the voters at an early date. He says, "I will work with other civic minded folks to bring an end to the inter-county dissension and develop a sense of civic pride to the end that Malheur county will grow and develop into a better county in which to live and rear our children. On this basis I ask for your support and vote for the office of county judge."

(Continued from Page 1) Treasury department as a staff member in promotion of War Bonds sales in San Francisco. Then in 1943 she joined the Womens Army corps.

During the period of 1943 to 1949 Miss Graham served in many positions of responsibility and trust. Among them were assignments in public relations, confidential secretary to the officer in charge of Philippine governmental affairs, chief clerk in provost marshal office in New Guinea, a army intelligence assignment, chief clerk of "Yank" magazine in 1945, in 1946 was chief clerk of the army newspaper, "Stars and Stripes", and in 1947 was assigned as secretary to the chief-of-staff of the Air Force in China.

She was evacuated from China in January 1949 and returned to Vale for a visit prior to leaving for Europe with the state department. She found her father in ill health and remained to take over his business as insurance agent and tax consultant. She has also served as justice of the peace of the Vale district since 1950.

Miss Graham makes her home with her mother in Vale. She is an Episcopalian, belongs to the PEO (women's educational group), a member of the Vale chamber of commerce and has served the past six years as a member of the county welfare board.

Miss Graham says that she feels that she is qualified from both educational and practical training standpoints, and that if elected will dispose of her private business interests and devote her full time to the business of the county, because "No person can serve two masters and do a good job of either task."

She is well known throughout Malheur county and is the niece of Don Graham of Nyssa. Her father was county judge from 1931 through 1942, and she says her interest in good government stemmed from this period.
