Malheur Welfare Report Shows Rise In December Aid

Cost of public assistance in Malheur county rose \$2,931 in December over November. The total spent for all types of assistance was \$34,589.46. Though higher than in November, total expenses were more than \$4,000 less than the same month one year ago.

As is normal this time of year, nearly all of the increased costs were for general assistance. Most of this money was used for families whose breadwinners are out of work for the winter months. In all 58 such families were assisted to a total amount of \$3,108.18. It is normal for general assistance costs to remain high during January and into February.

Old age assistance accounted for about 55 percent of all expenditures. Two hundred and twenty-one eligible aged persons received \$19,235.60. This figure includes \$6,875 paid to medical vendors on behalf of aged recipients.

Shortage of Funds To Reduce Loans For State Veterans

Oregon veterans' farm and home loans were granted to 30 veterans in Malheur county in 1959 in the amount of \$330,000. H. C. Saalfeld, director of State Veterans' Affairs, reported this week.

Starting this year, however, Saalfeld said, loans will be reduced about 65 percent because of a shortage of loan funds. This could mean that only 11 veterans in Malheur county will receive loans in the amount of \$122,400 during 1960, if the reduction were uniform statewide.

Actually, veterans' loan applications are being scheduled for funds statewide on a "first come, first served" basis. Loans for all Oregon will be limited to about 120 a month, starting in April, as against the average of 430 loans granted each month last year.

Saalfeld said the money shortage will continue through 1960, because the state veterans' department has reached the constitutional limit of bonds it may issue to finance the program. It may now loan only the money it receives from veterans' monthly loan repayments, after paying operating expenses.

Whether the shortage continues next year will depend on the outcome of a measure on the ballot in next November's election to increase the limit of bonds that may be issued. The loan program requires no tax funds and is self-sustaining.

Since the state veterans' loan program started in 1945, a total of 376 veterans in Malheur county have borrowed \$2,356,750.

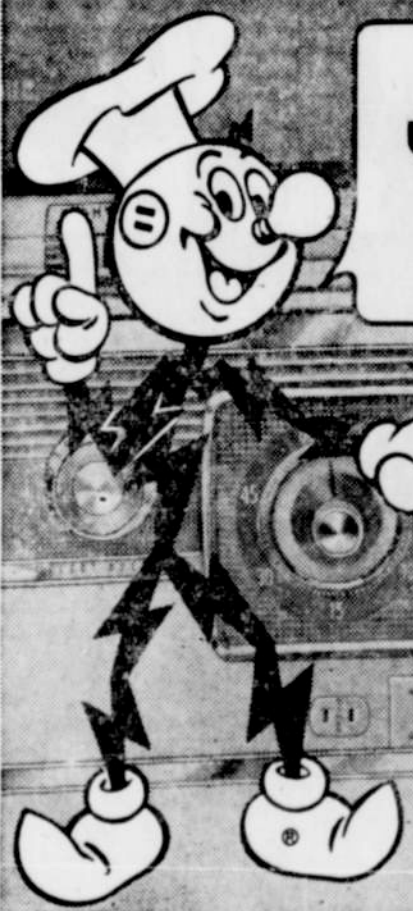

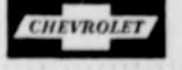
