Mr. and Mrs. Willis Conant visited at the Earl Kygar home Monday.



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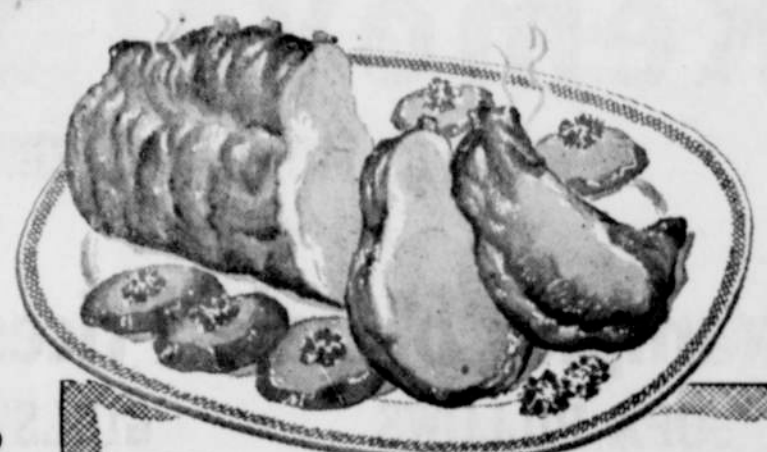
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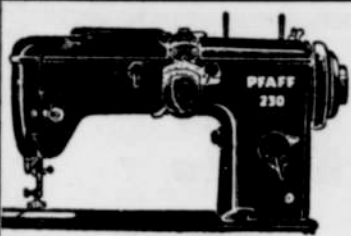
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
