Marie Earp, mother of Mrs. Herschel Thompson, moved her trailer home to the Thompson farm Monday. She sold her property in Emmett.

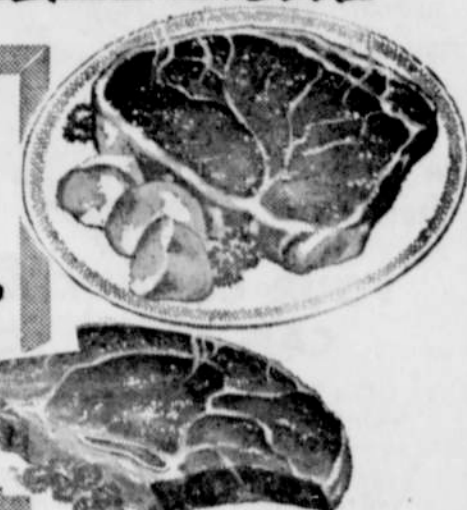


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
