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Auto-Safety Check Programs Increase

More Oregon communities than ever before have expressed an interest in conducting voluntary vehicle safety check programs in May and June.

Interested officials or citizens in 34 cities have requested safety-check planning materials from the Department of Motor Vehicles traffic safety division which is assisting the national sponsors, the Auto Industries Highway Safety committee, in coordinating the program. The activity has been endorsed by the Oregon Traffic Safety commission.

Terry Fitzgerald, representative of the industry group from Detroit, Mich., has been in Oregon most of this month and will spend part of April in contacting cities and assisting in setting up safety-check programs.

The safety office also has noted increasing interest on the part of schools in holding safety-check programs. Twenty high schools have received planning materials to assist in conducting teenage programs.

Community programs usually are sponsored by civic or service clubs in cooperation with city officials.

NHS Students Go To District Meet

Several students from NHS attended the district Eastern Oregon speech meet at EOC in La Grande March 29.

The students were judged for their speech abilities in different categories of speaking by speech instructor Lawrence Schwarz and librarian Harriet Brumbach.

Those attending in their winning categories were humorous interpretation, Broshia Case and Dave Moore; serious interpretation, Diane Low and Marlene Cooper; poetry, Marilyn Johnson and Broshia Case; oratory, Marilyn Johnson and Rena Dirksen; panel discussion, Dennis Leavitt; after dinner speaking, Dennis Leavitt.

Inspection lanes, which usually are manned by police officers, local auto mechanics and service club volunteers, give cars a 10-point checkup.

Inspection includes front and rear lights, turn signals, horn, glass, windshield wipers, brakes, steering, exhaust, tires and rear view mirror.

Last year, community safety-checks in Oregon enabled inspection of these 10 items on 42,320 cars and trucks. Nearly 9500 of these vehicles were rejected because of some defect and owners were urged to have them repaired.

Leading defects noted in the Oregon check were rear lights, steering, tires, exhaust and brakes.

Nationally, some 3 million cars were checked in the program last year.

While deficiencies in the condition of cars are not a primary cause of Oregon accidents, they are in some, and they are a contributing factor in others, safety officials explain.

Every car owner, they say, owes it to himself, his passengers and other street and highway users to drive a car that is mechanically fit and capable of reacting correctly in any emergency.

The national safety-check program is co-sponsored by the Auto Industries organization and Look magazine.

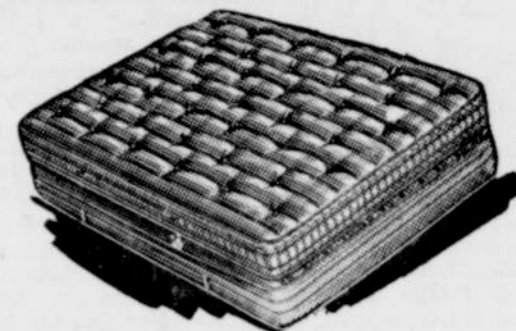
Senior Awarded Band Scholarship

First and second place district winners are eligible for state competition at the University of Oregon in Eugene April 8 and 9. Judges at EOC were instructors and professors of the college.

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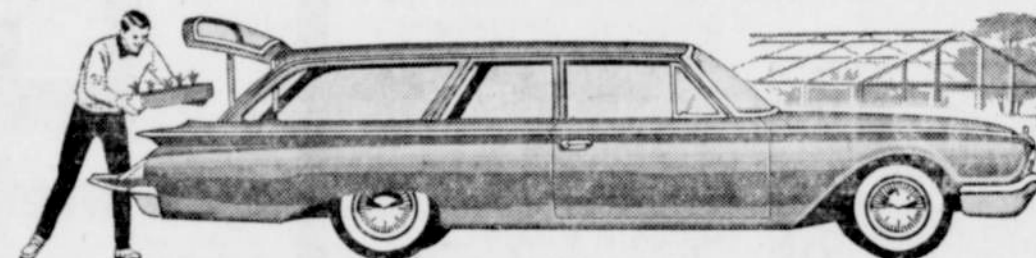
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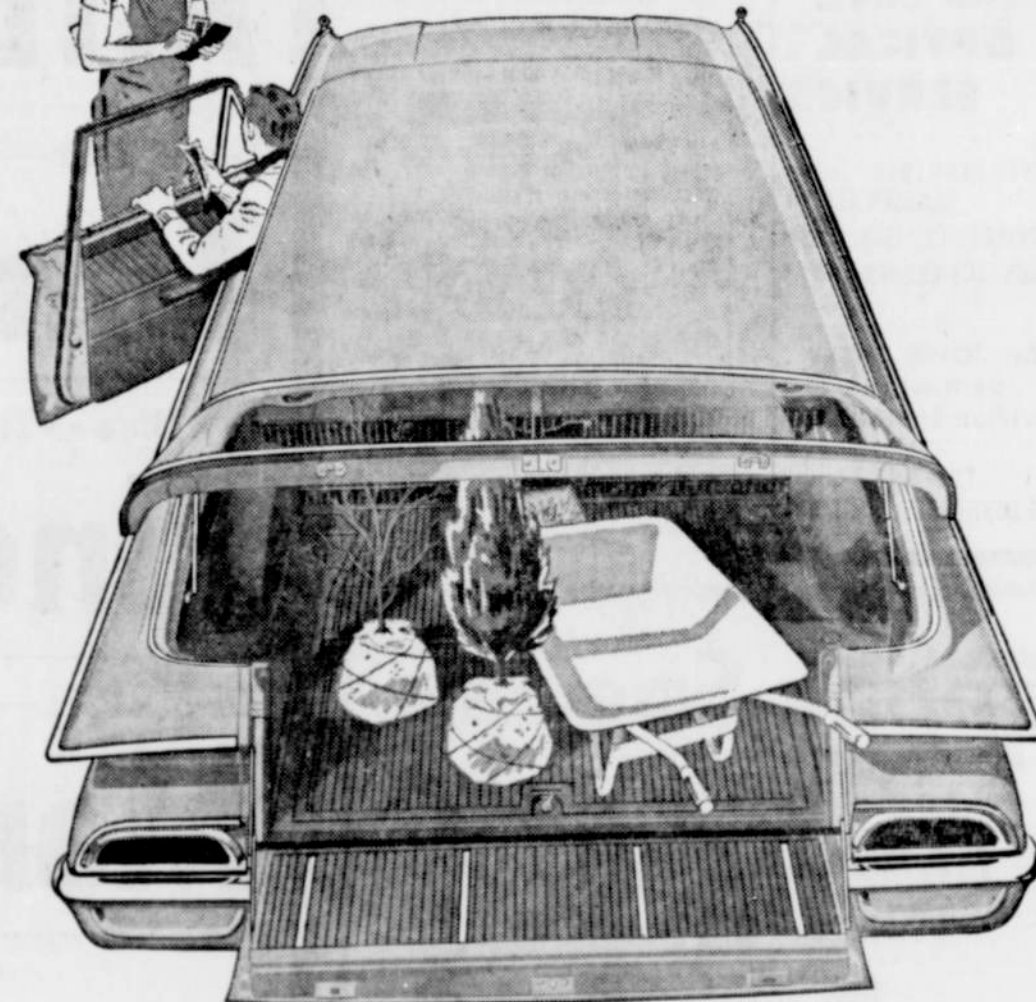
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
