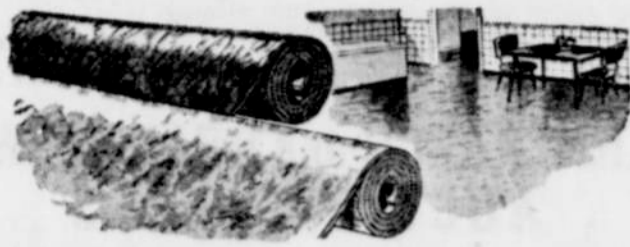

State Trout Season Opens Saturday; Restocking Should Make It a Success

Barring real bad weather, a vast majority of the Oregon anglers will be out bright and early Saturday morning, April 23, for the opening of the trout season. And the self-employed who put in the sixth day will probably be following the next day and seeking his own "hot spot" at the crack of dawn.

The Oregon game commission is predicting from good to excellent catches for most of the anglers during the opening week end. Most of the streams and some of the lakes have been restocked within the past two

weeks with pan size fish averaging 8 inches in length.

Barring severe thaw, Unity reservoir and the Burnt river below Unity dam should again be good producers for good sized rainbow. The Powder river above Baker is a likely choice and has been heavily restocked with rainbow trout. Higgins and Wyatt reservoirs should also produce rainbows of nice size.

In our own immediate area, the game commission, says the fishing will probably be best in the lakes and reservoirs, with the rainbows running large in Antelope, as they were running to 13 inches in length last fall. Beulah should be fair with bright prospects for Mann lake and Malheur reservoir.

Murky water is expected for the larger streams of the district, including Silver creek, middle and north forks of Malheur, Blitzen, and Silvies.

Recent planting of fish in the desert country of southeast Oregon total 127,000 with nearly 10,000 in the Owyhee river between Nyssa and Owyhee dam.

The commission says that anglers in the know will search out small high desert streams for their opening day outing as phenomenal trout are produced in creeks that anglers can jump across. Fish the high meadows for best success and bigger fish.

Music Professor To Audition Local Piano Students

Adjudication of 24 piano students in Nyssa will begin May 3 when Robert Stoltze of Portland arrives to preside at hearings sponsored by the National Guild of Piano Teachers. Alice Nishitani is chairman in Nyssa for auditions.

Students of Margaret Brown and Mrs. Nishitani will participate in the hearings to be held at the LDS stake house. Robert Nelson's students from Nyssa will play in Ontario.

Rhythm, accuracy, tone-quality, phasing and pedaling are among the thirty-two points considered in rating piano playing. Each student plays from memory three to ten numbers and all above elementary stage are required to pass a test on scales and cadences. The auditions are conducted privately to put the student at ease.

Robert Stoltze is associate professor of music at Lewis and Clark College where he has served on the staff since 1946. He was a student of the internationally known pianist and composer, Rudolph Ganz.

As a pianist, Mr. Stoltze has concertized extensively and appeared as soloist with orchestras. His compositions, ranging from art songs to symphonic works have received numerous performances.

On March 9 the premier performance of his new work, "Symphonic variations for chamber orchestra" will be performed by Boris Sirpo and the Portland Chamber orchestra.

Services Conducted Monday for W. Kohl

Final rites were held Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock for William Edward Kohl who succumbed Friday evening, following a heart attack.

Mr. Kohl was born Aug. 12, 1889, in St. Peter, Minn., and was married to Lyda Butcher in 1915. He was a school teacher in Montana for over 20 years. He also homesteaded and ran a service station in that state.

The Kohl family moved to Vale in 1941 where they operated a restaurant for 10 years. Due to ill health, Mr. Kohl retired in 1951 and moved to St. Maries, Idaho. Since that time, he and Mrs. Kohl have lived alternately in Nyssa and St. Maries.

A series of severe heart attacks brought him back to Nyssa in January of last year, where he remained until his death.

Mr. Kohl was a member of the Grange. He was an ardent reader and student of world affairs, kept an active interest in politics to the very end and was a highly respected member of this community.

He is survived by his wife, Lyda of the home; one son, William of Nyssa, and two daughters, Maida Winebrenner and Elizabeth Kohl of Astoria, Ore. Also surviving are one brother, Wesley of Osseo, Minn.; six grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Services were held at Lienkaemper chapel with the Rev. Paul Ludlow of the Nyssa Methodist church officiating. His body was cremated in Boise and the ashes taken to St. Maries, Idaho.
