

Nyssa Librarian Lists New Books Now Available

A number of interesting new books have recently been added to the circulation list at Nyssa library, according to Joy Bell, city librarian. Included in the volumes are:

ADULT READING:

"Hear Me, My Chiefs!" by L. V. McWhorter. This is not a glorified story of Indians but one which sifts the evidence to find the truth. Written without dullness, for the richness of the material is derived largely from the quoted and clearly beautiful expressions of the Indian friends of McWhorter.

"Candidates 1960" by Eric Sevareid. The thoughtful citizen's guide to the personalities, records, ambitions and strategies of the leading contenders in the race for the next presidential nominations.

"Wildfire" and "Lost Pueblo" by Zane Grey. The author's books speak for themselves.

"Folk Medicine" by D. C. Jarvis, M.D. Dr. Jarvis shows how folk medicine has been applied not only for the prevention and cure of sickness but also for the maintenance of good health.

"The Naked Communist" by W. Cleon Skousen. The incredible story of Communism is graphically told. It contains a distillation of more than a hundred books and treatises on Communism, many written by Marxist authors. Many questions are answered. Who gave Russia the A-bomb? How did the FBI fight the battle of the underground? and many more.

"Back to Berlin" by V. B. Carleton. This is a humane and spiritually moving story, which is entirely drawn from actual experience and true events.

"Gold in Your Attic" by Van Allen Bradley. This is a highly useful reference work for both the expert and casual collector of rare old books and limited and first editions. It features an up-to-date alphabetical index of hundreds of titles with values ranging from \$25 to \$25,000.

"Dr. Ida" by Dorothy Clarke Wilson. One of the great medical missionaries of all time. At ninety, Dr. Ida, "The Great Soul," is

"Seeds of Time" by Henry Savage. This volume is an attempt to show why, with singular solidarity, the South thinks and acts as it does by a relation of the aspects
