the sheriff's office, my contacts with people and my special training and work as juvenile officer make me fully qualified for the office as county judge and I'll appreciate your vote.

Earl Bopp—"Will give you an opportunity to adopt home rule in Malheur county, if I am elected. Have had 12 years experience in city administration in Ontario."

Commissioner Hopefuls Heard

Candidates for county commissioner were heard next for their allotted two minutes. Amel Claude declared that he had operated his own business since he was 19 years of age, believed he knew the problems of Malheur county better than almost anyone in the county, and would stand on his past record.

Ray Duncan said he had owned and operated his own ranch and had also managed mines in Idaho, was a property owner in Ontario and had some experience in most lines of business.

Jacob "Jake" Fischer told of the many committees and boards he was serving on, said he was a row-crop farmer and meat packer but that he was leasing part of his operations and would have time for the commissioner's work. He felt it was time to have a Democrat on the board.

Relate Qualifications

Extracts from opening statements of sheriff candidates were: Irvin Miller—"I have farmed here the past 17 years, will devote full time to the job and am clean and honest."

Doak Fulwyler—"Am a farmer of Willowcreek, have had considerable experience in law enforcement work and will dispose of my farm and devote full time to the job, if elected."

Wilbur Atkins—"Was chief of police in Vale for a number of years and will give up present job if elected."

Bob Ingram—"Have been chief of police in Vale 13 years, have worked closely with sheriff's office, and if elected will do my best for the welfare of the county."

John Elfering (incumbent) — "Besides having been sheriff of Malheur county for a number of years, was president of Oregon's State Sheriff's organization, and began police work on Los Angeles force."

some time in the post office and was at present assistant to the credit manager of Ore-Ida and was fully qualified.

Tully Griffith, candidate for the same office, said he received his formal education in Kansas schools but had been in Oregon for 24 years and farmed 20 of them. He thanked the Farm Bureau and suggested that they start a taxpayers league.

Candidates Answer Questions

First question put to the candidates was "Should the road to Owyhee reservoir be oiled, and if so, how financed?" The answers were generally that it should be done as soon as possible without using county funds, as it was a tourist attraction in this part of the state and the area should be developed from this standpoint of revenue, if for no other reason.

Most seemed, however, to feel it was a state project but Peters said he thought it could be done through construction of a toll road—thereby letting fishermen and the resort owners pay for it.

On the question of "What can be done to promote better relations among the people of the county," the answers ranged from Duncan's "keep a written record of the actions of the county court so the people can tell what took place" to White's saying that if the public was informed as to what was coming before the court and when, it would give people more confidence in their county officers and they would know they were treated more fairly.

Graham suggested that if the people would try informing themselves more on their county officers and their work instead of "gripping" so much it would help. The commissioners seemed to agree that the court should have no say over the road districts of the county.

Answer Jail Question

The candidates for sheriff were asked if they felt a new jail was needed or if the old one should be remodeled. Fulwyler said, "Remodel, let us actually economize and not just talk about it." Atkins, "A new jail, we have \$80,000 left over from the old funds that cannot be used any other way and we need it." Miller and Elfering both said a new jail was needed, while Ingram said he didn't believe it was the duty of the sheriff to determine if a new jail was needed.

Ed Oakes and Emil Stunz, candidates for Malheur county representative, were introduced and made brief statements. Oakes told of his background and stated that he felt funds could be obtained from the state to eventually finish the Qwyhee road.

Stunz told the Farm Bureau that he felt they were performing a good service for the people through this series of meetings as they helped the candidate and voter to get acquainted. He said he thought we should get rid of the Owyhee road and on some other county projects.
