

Oregon PTA Congress Adopts New Legislative Platform on Education

"The Individual, His Needs, Potential and Fulfillment" was the theme of Oregon Congress of Parents and Teachers convention held at Medford April 26-28. Mrs. Leigh Gustison, state PTA president, presided over the convention of nearly 1000 delegates from Oregon. Attending from Malheur county were Mrs. John Elfering, Vale, state recording secretary; Mrs. Dow Meek, Vale, junior vice president of region eight, and Mrs. Lester Cleaver, Nyssa president, representing Malheur county council for Mrs. Lloyd Johnson, Ontario, who was unable to attend because of illness.

Delegates from Ontario were Mr. and Mrs. Oliver Parker, from Nyssa was Mrs. Clarence Clapp and from Vale, Mrs. W. E. Swygart and Mrs. Leonard Glascock.

Legislation to Be Decided

By-laws were revised to add another junior vice president, making a total of nine regions. The congress also adopted a new legislative platform concerning following basic beliefs affecting the health, welfare and education of children, defining the fields of legislation which are within the scope of the legislation program of the Oregon Congress of Parents and Teachers. Specific bills that conform to these beliefs may be acted upon by the Oregon congress.

Keynote address was given by Mrs. Leon Price of Texas, publicity chairman of the national congress. Welcome address was by Oregon Gov. Mark Hatfield.

Individual Subject of Addresses

"The Individual's Challenge to the Community" was a symposium report given Tuesday afternoon by members who had attended the White House conference held in Washington, D.C. Dr. Paul Wright of the Portland First Presbyterian church was the evening speaker on "The Individual's Challenge to the Home."

On Wednesday 19 workshops were held, each four times. They covered every phase of chairmanship and provided material for the next year's work in PTA. A banquet was held that evening at Hedrick junior high with charcoal broiled sirloin steaks served to over 900 delegates of Oregon. The PTA mother singers choral group provided a concert for entertainment.

Sessions Continue Thursday

On Thursday morning activities included a business session and president's report. Astoria was selected as the site for the 1961 convention. Topic of roundtable discussion was "The Individual's Challenge to Education." Thirty-five new scholarships were announced with 61 renewals. This makes a total of 96 student scholarships being sponsored by the state with all PTA units subscribing to the fund.

Newly elected officers for two-year terms were Mrs. Wallace Van Hise, Bend, second vice president, and Mrs. George York, Portland, treasurer.

United Church Ladies Hear Various Topics At Fellowship Session

Theme for May Fellowship Day sponsored by United Church Women of the Nyssa-Adrian area Friday, May 6, was "Citizenship—Free and Responsible." Mrs. Maylin Maxfield explained that to be a respectable citizen one must also be a responsible person and above all a Christian.

Mrs. Wm. Fitzsimmons talked on home, where a child learns his first responsibilities and to respect the rights and properties of others, under parental guidance.

Mrs. Max Urry, speaking on schools, "We do not want obedient servants of the state, we want intelligent, well informed free men and women who can weigh facts from sound judgment and act accordingly. They must be given true facts and information and helped by understanding parents and teachers and be allowed to know both sides."

The church was topic by Mrs. Lester Oden. "No matter what ideas we have, which is our privilege, we do not have the right to force those ideas on others. We can preserve our Christian freedom by being individuals."

Mrs. Anna Pratt spoke on the community—local and the world. Laws have been in existence for centuries, not to keep citizens from wrong doing or to punish them, but rather to preserve the freedom of being respectable and responsible people.

A covered dish luncheon preceded the program with the Presbyterian church as hostess. Mrs. Mary Leader of Buhl, Idaho, mother of Mrs. W. E. Piercy returned thanks. Mrs. Wm. Schireman presided at the business meeting following luncheon.

Special music was a hymn in Spanish by Mrs. Agusto Vereau who accompanied herself on the guitar. Pianist was Mrs. Vern Bishop, Mrs. D. L. Hurst directed the singing and Mrs. Dyre Roberts was in charge of the nursery. The Rev. Vereau pronounced a Spanish benediction.

Nearly fifty were in attendance at this meeting in the Presbyterian church, and the next meeting of the United Church Women will be World Community day on Oct. 7.
