Polio Protection Lacking

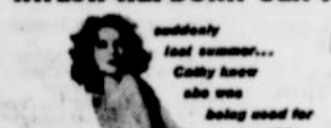
Only about 50 percent of Oregon residents are adequately protected against polio, and even fewer have had shots against other diseases.
