

Rescuers' Warned To Leave Baby Wildlife in Woods

The time of the year has arrived when many persons roving the fields and woods of Oregon will be taken in by the pleading, limpid-eyed look of one of mother nature's most beautiful residents—baby deer. Other baby wildlife will also be picked up and taken home by would-be benefactors, the Oregon Game commission predicts.

First reaction of many individuals is to pick up what they believe is a poor deserted creature and thus become a champion of wildlife. However, such an act is the beginning of a sad life for a wild animal and often tragedy for the wildlife-napper. Already this year several young fawns have been the victims of wildlife do-gooders.

All persons are reminded that Oregon laws make it illegal for anyone to pick up and hold in captivity any wild bird or animal of the state without a permit from the game commission, which does not issue permits for the keeping of fawn deer. Violators may be subject to heavy fine.

This ruling is to protect both the fawns and people involved. Not only does captivity put the fawn in unnatural surroundings, but often as the fawn grows older it becomes vicious. Many persons in the past and several this year have been seriously injured

by the slashing hooves or sharp-tined antlers of their "pets."

All young wildlife are provided with adequate camouflage for protection. The spotted coat of fawns is a classic example of the protection nature provides. Female deer regularly leave their young while they forage. Fawns, dependent upon their camouflage, will allow persons to come near and even pet them. Often the mother is frightened away from her fawn by the interloper but will return promptly when danger is past.

Only close observation should be the extent of the visitor's relation with fawns and other wildlife young. So, when little "bam-bi" gives with the soft-eyed look, or any other wildlife for that matter, break out the camera, then leave the little fellow right where you found him.

Utility Co. Says Power Use Will Double by 1970

Substantial developments in the economy of Idaho Power company's service area will see its use of electricity more than double to reach six and one half billion kilowatt-hours by 1970 and the utility is steadily gearing up to meet the demand, it was reported recently.

"Just as Idaho Power increased its generating capacity five and one half times its 1948 output to pace the area's growth, so are we continuing to build to boost our capacity again to meet the needs of tomorrow," said T. E. Roach, the company's president.

He said the steady climb in power use in the Snake river valley can be traced to such factors as new and expanded businesses, new homes and higher standards of living, creation of new processing industries, population growth, and the development of additional land by electric-pump irrigation.

Roach's prediction of future power use in this area came as it was announced in New York that the total generating capacity of the nation's investor-owned electric utilities will reach more than 492 million kilowatts by 1980. The announcement was made by Allen S. King, president of the Edison Electric Institute, utility trade association, commenting on a new institute study called "Meeting Tomorrow's Power Needs."

nearly four times today's total and almost twice that expected for 1970.

The EEI study, he said, shows that the utilities "stand ready and able to meet in full the future power needs of this country."

Roach said electric-pump irrigation is a major contributor to the continuing climb in power use in southern Idaho and eastern Oregon.

"With an average of nearly 40,000 acres put to better use by electric-pump irrigation each year in the last decade, a total of 176,000 horsepower has been added to the company's pumping load just since 1949."

Equally as dramatic, the utility executive said, is the fact manufacturing is joining agriculture as the foundation of the area's economy.

"Idaho's estimated 1959 income of \$250 million from manufacturing now compares with its \$210 million income from agricultural crops and its \$190 million income from livestock," Roach said. "Thus it is not surprising to find a nationally known firm of security underwriters concluding in an analysis of Idaho Power's area that the state is on the threshold of an important industrial advance."

To meet the growing demand for power, he stated, the utility will continue to "build new service facilities of every description."

During the past decade, the company's net utility plant has jumped more than 290 percent, compared with an increase of 154 percent for all U. S. investor-owned utilities.

"We have invested nearly \$152,000,000 in new facilities of all types in the last five years alone to boost our total electric utility plant to more than \$300,000,000," Roach said.

Hay Derrick Mishap Warns of Danger

The danger of placing hay derricks near power lines has been emphasized by a suit filed against a Murtaugh, Idaho, farmer, his wife and Idaho Power company for a boy injured when the derrick boom on which he was swinging struck a power line.

Named co-defendants in the suit were Charles L. Johnson and his wife, Ruth Johnson, on whose farm the accident took place. They are charged with negligence for leaving the derrick in such close proximity to the power line that the boom was in striking distance of the wires.

The \$43,453.80 suit was filed in district court at Twin Falls by Clarence Randall, also of Murtaugh, in behalf of his son, Gary Edward Randall, 15.

Young Randall received severe burns requiring amputation of four toes on his right foot and all the toes on his left foot.
