

Variety of New Volumes Listed At County Library

New books going into circulation Saturday, July 2, at Malheur county library include the following:

"The Thief in the White Collar" by Norman Jaspas. The complete story of a billion dollar a year business: embezzling — who does it and how, and what can be done about it.

"Maya" by Charles Gallenkamp. Discoveries about the Mayan civilization made through five expeditions form the basis for this study of a remarkable nation that flourished and died before the Western world had entered the modern period.

"Governors of Oregon" by George S. Turnbull. Sketches of Oregon's state governors and other executives who preceded them.

"High Tension" by Hugh Bailie. Forty-five years of current history as seen through the eyes of the colorful, hard-hitting reporter who became president of the United Press.

"Man of Courage" by Kathryn E. Harrod. A biography of Dr. Edward L. Toudeau who spent his life seeking a cure for tuberculosis.

"Writer's Roundtable" edited by Helen Hull. Twenty-one writers, editors and agents combine in this handbook to offer the new

writer advice based on their experience and skill.

"Bride Stealer" by Frank O'Rourke. An absorbing story of a Western Robin Hood.

"A Treasury of Poems for Worship and Devotion" edited by Charles L. Wallis. A collection of 460 poems chosen from classic and modern sources.

"A Professional Storywriter's Handbook" on the craft of writing stories by a professional freelance writer of 30 years' experience.

"Errand at Shadow Creek" by Geoffrey Cotterell. The story of an Englishman who has gone to Australia to make a new life.

"The Nunery" by Dorothy Charques. The downfall of Anne Boleyn and the dispersal of the religious houses of England are the two themes of this novel, a link being provided by the secret marriage of the queen's loyal adherent, Sir John Acock, to young Jane Ingham, ward of the prioress of the Cokerhill nunnery.

"Back to Berlin" by V. B. Carleton. A German Jew who escaped Hitler's Germany to become an Englishman, tries to purge himself of a nagging sense of guilt by returning to Germany and remaining there even though he finds it as militaristic and anti-Semitic as ever.

"Passage of Arms" by Eric Ambler. An American businessman and his wife on a world cruise become involved in a transaction which seems honest, simple and safe but which is actually anything else.

Forbess Continues Chemistry Research

Dennis L. Forbess, son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Forbess of Nyssa, will be one of the undergraduate students working alongside scientists at the University of Oregon this summer. This program is the result of a National Science Foundation grant of \$32,000, awarded the university's graduate school under the Foundation's Undergraduate Research program.

Some 29 students will take part in the program during the summer with 19 participating during the academic year. The program is designed to develop the interest of the superior student in scientific research, method and knowledge of investigative procedures.
