

Rites Held Tuesday For Jacob R. Cornell

Final services were held Tuesday, July 5, for Jacob Rufus Cornell who died Friday in an Ontario nursing home.

Mr. Cornell was born Feb. 12, 1878, in Macon, Ill. He was married to Mary Ingram Oct. 21, 1907, in Minneola, Kan. In 1913 the family moved to Big Pine, Calif., and in 1932 came to Nyssa. Since that time, he was engaged in farming and carpentry work. At one time he was owner and operator of Nyssa's bowling alley where Schoen studio is now located.

Since 1940, he and his wife had lived in Nyssa and for the past two years, Mr. Cornell had been in failing health.

Survivors include his wife, Mary of Nyssa; three sons, Russell of Spokane, Lawrence of Boise and James of Eugene; four daughters, Thelma Dalton of Huntington Park, Calif., Zelma Cowden of La Puente, Calif., Mildred Massa of Boise and Clella Jamieson of Nyssa.

Also surviving are one sister, Nina Thompson of Colorado, 19 grandchildren and 15 great-grandchildren.

Services, under the direction of Lienkaemper funeral home, were held at the chapel with the Rev. Paul Ludlow of the Methodist church officiating. Interment was made in the Nyssa cemetery.

Added to Shelves at Malheur Library

New books going into circulation Saturday, May 28, at Malheur county library include a variety of subjects dealing with government, labor, management, the UN and other timely problems facing the United States.

"The Enemy Within" by Robert F. Kennedy. The counsel of the McClellan committee candidly reports on the work and results of a three-year Senate investigation of improper activities in the labor or management field.
"The Invisible Presidency" by Louis W. Koenig. Studies of seven men who have been advisors, confidants and assistants to six U.S. presidents.

"To Try Men's Souls" by Harold M. Hyman. The author studies the backgrounds of the various loyalty tests and examines their effects on individuals, groups, and institutions.

"Conservatives in Power" by Edwin L. Dale. A clear and absorbing account of American domestic economy.

"United Nations: Hope for a Divided World" by Sir Leslie Munro. New Zealand's delegate to the UN devotes special attention to the great conflicts in which the UN and its chief members have been involved as he explains the history and activities of that world organization.

"The Icicle and the Sun" by William Sansom. A brief introduction to four very individualistic countries: Denmark, Sweden, Finland and Norway.

"The Puma's Claw" by Simon Clark. The authentic story of the adventurous young men who found and climbed a fabulous mountain in Peru.

"God's Man" by Clarissa Start Davidson. Biography of Martin Niemöller.

"Desert Gold and Total Prospecting" by Henry Curtis Morris. Reminiscences of a mining engineer who knew the West in the boom days at the turn of the century.

"Prayer for an Assassin" by Igor Sentjurs. A novel of present-day Budapest.

"Easy Prey" by Josephine Bell. A Cock Robin mystery.

"Siskiyou Trail" by Ashley Howard Russell. A historical novel that tells of pack trains on mountain trails, Indian wars and feuds between settlers and the Army.

"Crowded Sky" by Hank Searls. An informative novel about the technicalities of air travel, also absorbing for the human problems it explores.
