# Record Corn Crop RETURN FROM 10-DAY TRIP

harvests of other grains are forecast for Oregon this year, reports Mrs. Elvera Horrell, extension agricultural economist at Oregon State college.

The largest corn crop ever produced in the state is due for har-vest this fall, Mrs. Horrell found as she studied reports from the U.S. department of agriculture. A crop of more than 4 million bushels is forecast, which would be 8 percent above last year's record high and nearly 21/2 times the average of the past 10 years.

However, wheat, Oregon's largest cash crop, may show a drop of about 3 percent compared to last year, Mrs. Horrell also found. This year's crop is forecast at about 27 million bushels. This would still be about 2 percent above average.

The state's oats crop, expected to total about 7.1 million bushels after harvest is over, will be 8 percent below last year and 29 percent less than average.
