

State Farm Bureau Members to Quiz Neuburger, Smith

Mrs. Maurine Neuburger and Elmo Smith, aspirants for Oregon senatorship in the November election, will appear at the mid-summer resolutions conference of the Oregon Farm Bureau at Bend July 30.

The Democratic and Republican candidates will be pitted with questions developed by committee members who will be developing study resolutions for county Farm Bureau consideration in the fall policy making of the general farm organization.

This will be the first meeting of the two candidates during the campaign.

Described by Gerald Detering, president of the Oregon Farm Bureau, as a portion of the "power in the people" program of the bureau, he said the candidates would be given equal time to answer the questions ranging from taxation, farm labor and education through the general farm program of the major political parties.

Detering said the county Farm Bureaus over the state have been holding like meetings with local and state candidates for public office and that results of these meetings show people are still interested in political affairs of the state and nation.

Farm Bureau members from 32 Farm Bureau counties will be on hand for the two-day resolutions meeting and, Detering stressed, all members and interested persons are invited to sit in on the meeting as well as the July 30 program at 11 a.m. featuring the senatorial candidates' discussion of top issues.

The first day of the meeting will be taken up with committee meetings on farm program, international affairs, natural resources, education, taxation, transportation and public relations. The committees will formulate questions for the candidates and all committees are made up of farmers and ranchers from county Farm Bureaus.

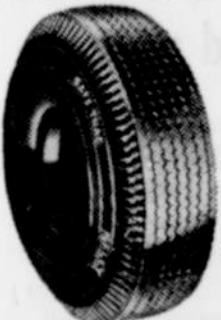

County FHA Loans \$748,670 for Year

Malheur county Farmers Home administration advanced funds totaling \$748,670 during the fiscal year just completed, according to Orland E. Cheldelin, retiring member of the Malheur county FHA committee.

This is the first time for several years that the total amount loaned did not exceed a million dollars. This reduction was because real estate loan funds were not available for applications on hand.

Cheldelin also reported that collections for the last fiscal year totaled \$1,010,901 and the amount of outstanding loans as of June 30, 1960, was \$4,610,472.

Cheldelin said that many farm families in the area have repaid their FHA loans and are now financing their operations through local banks and Production Credit associations.

In each county the FHA Advisory committee determines eligibility of applicants for all types of FHA loans. The committee also reviews the progress of borrowers and aids Farm Home administration personnel in adapting the agency's loan policies to conditions faced by farmers in the area.

Oregon Rejects Vitamin Request Of Idaho Dairy

The state department of agriculture has turned down request of Home Dairies company, Nampa, Idaho, to add three more vitamins to milk sold in Oregon.

The Idaho concern wanted vitamins B6, E and pantothenol approved for Oregon sales. This company promotes a Nutri-Seal milk line featuring nine vitamins, six of which are legal in Oregon. Home Dairies markets its milk in several Oregon areas, including Nyssa, Ontario and Burns.

Findings of the June 28 public hearing and the conclusions are contained in the order of the hearings officer, W. E. Upshaw, manager of the department's Portland branch office.

His conclusions in part: 1. Claims of the petitioners that the three vitamins are needed in the diet of milk users are far overshadowed by contradictory evidence and testimony of a long list of nutritional and dairy authorities and officials.

2. The three vitamins are in abundance in many other foods consumed by the average person. Moreover, "with reasonable certainty" there is a serious question that external introduction of vitamins may establish an imbalance in the natural relationships of vitamins.

3. In a few special cases need may exist for an infant feeding of vitamin B6, but this is a matter of medical advice and does not justify the department opening the gates to use of even this vitamin.

4. Evidence submitted, and particularly that of James A. Tobey, milk authority with degrees in medicine and law, showed pure milk is recognized... as "undeniably our most nearly perfect food"... and possesses all of the known vitamins.

5. Finally, the introduction of the three vitamins or any other similar ingredient, could and would seriously affect the economic welfare of the Oregon producers and handlers of milk.

On the last point, Upshaw said Oregon milk producers are "digging deep into their pockets" to raise \$200,000 to promote milk as nature's most perfect food. The petitioners, on the other hand, indirectly indicate otherwise to the public.

U.S. Beet Growers Win New Acreage

The U.S. Department of Agriculture recently allocated 558,000 tons of sugar to beet and cane sugar growers of the United States for fulfillment of the 1960 quota.

This tonnage represents the amount allocated originally to Hawaii, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands but which they could not fill. Normally Cuba would have received 155,334 tons of this allotment had not President Eisenhower denied it to them under the new Sugar bill.

Of these 558,000 tons, 425,700 were allocated to sugar beet growers and 131,300 to cane sugar producers.

This will be of little value to growers of the immediate area for this year but Montana and Colorado will be able to use some of their excess acreage to fill this quota. And there is a possibility that the tonnage normally given to Cuba might be used to increase acreage in some new areas in another year.

The new allocations bring the quotas for the U.S. beet sugar area to 2,514,945 tons and for cane
