Rites Held Tuesday For Pioneer Woman, Mrs. Susan McD'Roe

Funeral services were held Tuesday morning at Beecher chapel in Ontario for Susan McD'Roe, 92, who succumbed Friday evening, Aug. 12, 1960, in Norton nursing home at Nampa, following a lingering illness.

Mrs. McD'Roe was born Susan Applegate Sept. 8, 1867, in Toledo, Ohio, a daughter of Gilbert and Liza Eteau Applegate. She was married to George Edward McD'Roe on Feb. 7, 1893, in Toledo. Mr. McD'Roe preceded her in death on April 14, 1938.

The family was pioneers of the Ironside community, homesteading in that area in 1909. In recent years Mrs. McD'Roe had made her home with a son, James in Parma, Idaho.

Mrs. McD'Roe was a member of the Methodist church. She was fond of entertaining and devoted much of her time in helping others.

Approximately six years ago she fell and broke a hip. Then on Oct. 31 of last year, another fall fractured the other hip and she had been hospitalized since that time.

Survivors include two sons, James of Parma and Carl of Ontario and Ironside three grandchildren, Joe and Philip McD'Roe of Ontario and Ironside and Mrs. Ruth House of Albany, Ore.

Also surviving are two sisters, Mrs. Gertrude Rush and Mrs. Laura Ogden, both of Grants Pass, Ore., and one brother, Harold Applegate of Phoenix, Ariz.

The Rev. Howard Larsen of the First Christian church of Ontario officiated at the services and interment was made at Evergreen cemetery in Ontario.
