ment with a previous county court and he had continued to honor it but doubted this would be continued in another two years.

Chester's 10-Year Plan Told

On the question of justification of paving Lytle boulevard, Chester said that was part of his planning and thinking for the past 10 years, and that it was only good business to build a shorter route for traffic through Vale headed south to Nevada or southeast up the Snake river valley and called attention to the distance being 10 miles shorter to Owyhee corner through the new road than through Nyssa. He made no pretense of planning a farm-to-market road.

His planning called for the state taking over the road, which he says he is sure they will do after a bridge is built that will meet their specifications. But that now they would not accept the road as the approach to the present bridge is too sharp for large vehicles to make the turn onto or off Lytle boulevard.

Traffic Counter Near Vale End

When the Journal reporter stated that he had traveled Lytle boulevard from Enterprise avenue to Vale and had met only three vehicles at 3 o'clock in the afternoon, he was shown a letter from the state highway engineer, dated April 4, 1960, showing a traffic count of 220 vehicles per day.

The judge admitted the traffic counter was near town and below the road coming in from Sand Hollow. This road is 12 miles long and has 22 families on it but they travel the existing pavement considerably less than one mile.

It was suggested that the counter would have given a better index of true travel if placed about six miles out from Vale but the judge made it clear that was the business of the highway department.

He said that on the Foothill drive project 10 percent of the cost was pledged by individuals on the road. This amounted to approximately \$7200 and that there was from \$3000 to \$4000 unpaid and he doubted that anyone would go out and collect. He said he was not sure if they were legally collectible.

Chester said that the \$10,200 Vale had agreed to pay would be handled the same way, that there would not be a written contract covering the agreement, and that it was entirely possible that Vale could renege on payment the same as the individuals of Foothill drive.

Vale's Share Not 10% of Bridge

Among other things the Journal representative learned were: (1) The \$102,000 figure is still an estimate and that it could cost a great deal more than estimated, just as the new court house did; (2) that the publicity given Vale about paying 10 percent of the cost of the bridge was erroneous. The \$102,000 estimate was not the cost of the bridge alone but included paving from the end of Lytle boulevard to the bridge and cost of three blocks of road construction on the Vale side of the river, together with cost of easements and the approach to the bridge.

All land on the north side of the river is in the city of Vale and only the portion left over after they had paid their costs would be applied on cost of the bridge proper.

Chester wound up the conference with the statement that in his opinion it didn't matter how Flock voted on the bridge, as the March 11 contract was valid and would be enforced by the county or Vale one. But that in the event he was wrong he'd use the funds on the Juntura to Beulah project which had been approved by the state highway department as another of the farm-to-market projects.

82,000 Visitors See OSC Museum During Two Years

Guns, dolls, Indian artifacts, coins, butter churns and the famous Hank Monk stage coach were among the items viewed by the record number of 82,548 visitors to Oregon State college's Horner museum of the Oregon country this past biennium.

During this two-year period, 912 tours were given to school groups with 26,448 students participating. The museum is located on the ground level of the OSC coliseum.

A total of 477 display items was acquired by the museum during the biennium, making a total of 12,414 articles that have been presented to the museum since its beginning.

Items acquired during the past year include Early American glassware and majolica, extensive shell collection, an elaborate silver-decorated saddle used by the late Gov. Douglas McKay and oriental art objects.

Miss Lula M. Stephenson, museum curator, said other items exhibited include pioneer furniture and clothing, Indian artifacts from pre-Columbian to present, quilt collection and old-time candle molds.

One of the major items displayed is a replica of the nation's capitol which is valued at \$70,000. In addition to the historical collections, the museum includes a natural history section with mounted birds and animals of Oregon, fossil and mineral collections and an art room with art pieces from around the world.

Many items are on loan to the museum from descendants of pioneer families. Campus visitors have found the museum an excellent place to while away time to good advantage. Items can be found to interest both the old and young, Miss Stephenson said.

The museum is open week days from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.; Saturday, 10 a.m. to 12 noon and 2 to 5 p.m.; and Sunday, 2 to 5 p.m. There is no admission charge.
